# Walhampton Monument - Freelance Conservation Project Management Brief

### **Background and Context**

The Walhampton Monument [SO41 5SE] is a tribute to Admiral Sir Harry Burrard Neale - 1765 - 1840, sailor, courtier, philanthropist and Member of Parliament.

This project will revolve around the life and time of Sir Harry his role in the community and nationally. Using primary and secondary resource materials and scholarship we explore his impact on the town of Lymington, his connections and naval career. We will develop a range of learning and engagement projects inspired by the research to share with children, families and the wider public. Integral to the project is the restoration, conservation and interpretation of the substantial Monument raised to Sir Harry in 1840, paid for by public subscription.

Sir Harry died on 7th February 1840 in Brighton and on 25th February a public meeting in Lymington resolved to open a subscription for a monument. The foundation stone was laid on September 15th attended by some 2000 people.

#### **The Walhampton Monument**

In 2015 Columba Cook, conservation architects, were engaged to survey the monument and make recommendations as to an appropriate restoration and conservation programme. Their report forms the basis of the application for funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The Monument, a 22m tall Egyptionate obelisk consists of a 17m tall granite needle sitting on a stepped square plinth topped with an Egyptian cornice. The Monument is constructed of Large Dartmoor Blue Granite blocks from the Foggintor Quarry. Raised stone tablets with cast iron plaques are placed centrally on each of the faces of the plinth; each plaque provides information about Sir Harry's life. A scarab has been carved into each face of the needle just below the pyramidal top. The base of the monument is surrounded by Purbeck Limestone paving bounded by granite kerbs containing the stubs of the original railings which were removed during World War II. The railings surrounded the monument on four sides with tall corner posts terminating in a trident, one of which has survived in an adjoining garden. The Monument [add grid ref here] lies in the New Forest National Park and is listed Grade II\*

The Granite blocks are generally in good condition with sharp arises and smooth even faces exhibiting very little evidence of pitting or erosion. The blocks appear to have been bedded on soft lime mortar with higher aggregate to lime ratio. Dartmoor Blue granite is a moderately coarse grained stone composed of quartz, white feldspar and white and black mica. There are isolated, minor signs of erosion and mechanical damage to the granite probably occurring when the blocks were originally lifted into place and there are a few pits in the surface of the stone where large feldspar crystals may have come away. This damage is superficial and does not require any action.

The pointing at all levels is in poor condition. Water running through the core of the needle has leached the lime binder from the bedding mortar and re-deposited it at the surface of the joints and on the face of the stones. At lower level, in the stone plinth, the joints are either completely empty or contain only thin, superficial pointing. A hacksaw blade can be easily inserted in the joints up to its full depth.

There is black staining centrally on the north, east and west elevations of the monument. The staining is greatest on the sheltered north and east elevations. The staining appears to be associated with rain-water emerging through the joints from the core of the needle. Structural engineers reports have confirmed that the monument and its foundation do not show any sign of large-scale movement or structural instability. There has been isolated movement of stones related to plant growth in the Egyptian cornice at the junction between the plinth and the needle.

On the mound adjacent to the monument are three mature trees, which are not expected to encroach further on the monument. However there is a possibility that the roots may be impinging on the brick foundations and this will require additional investigation

The Cast iron plaques are in good condition and do not show any signs of deterioration but the raised lettering has been obscured by the accumulation of successive layers of paint. Early photographs show that the plaques were originally stone coloured to match the granite with lettering picked out in black. This could be replicated to improve the legibility of the text.

The Purbeck stone around the base of the monument is in poor condition, water collecting at the base of the monument has washed away the sand bedding material under the slabs causing them to sink and expose the brick foundation. The paving stones will need to be carefully lifted and good stones set aside for reuse. A new foundation incorporating new drainage should be laid prior to relaying the paving.

## Interpretation and fencing

A trident, part of the original fencing of the Monument has been recovered from an adjacent garden and will be returned to the site. This will be restored and integrated into a prominent 'arrival/interpretation feature for Monument Lane entrance to site. A smaller scale trident marker will replace the existing interpretation at the Undershore Road access point. It is proposed to situate an interpretation point in the Town Centre drawing attention to the monument.

It is proposed that the Monument lane boundary is protected with estate fencing.

# Artist Blacksmith - Brief

### **Background and Context**

The Walhampton Monument [SO41 5SE] is a tribute to Admiral Sir Harry Burrard Neale - 1765 - 1840, sailor, courtier, philanthropist and Member of Parliament.

This project will revolve around the life and time of Sir Harry his role in the community and nationally. Using primary and secondary resource materials and scholarship we explore his impact on the town of Lymington, his connections and naval career. We will develop a range of learning and engagement projects inspired by the research to share with children, families and the wider public. **Integral to the project is the restoration, conservation and interpretation of the substantial Monument raised to Sir Harry in 1840, paid for by public subscription.** 

Sir Harry died on 7th February 1840 in Brighton and on 25th February a public meeting in Lymington resolved to open a subscription for a monument. The foundation stone was laid on September 15th attended by some 2000 people.

Essential to the project is the creation of new 'statement' interpretation features that carry written information but within a **'sculptural framework'** that reflects the Life of Sir Harry Burard Neale.

The Original Monument was surrounded by a set of decorative railings, which were, like railings all over the UK, removed for recycling during World War II. One of the original Trident posts has been recovered from a nearby garden and it is envisaged that this is restored and integrated into one of the interpretation features.

Three sculptural interpretation points.

- 1. **Monument Lane entrance** to the Site Principal interpretation point on site carrying significant narrative. It is the intention that the original trident column be restored and included in the design of this interpretation point. Interpretation point to be a significant feature on site designed sympathetically for the site.
- 2. Undershore Road access point Secondary interpretation point access to the Walhampton Site is by the Solent Way managed by Hampshire County Council. This is a significantly constrained site and interpretation feature will be of medium scale This interpretation point to share motifs with the Primary interpretation feature and to encourage walkers up the Solent way
- 3. Town Quay Interpretation Point The Walhampton Monument is clearly visible from the Town Quay [Managed by New Forest District Council] but is situated across the Beaulieu River. This Modest interpretation point to share motifs with the Walhampton site interpretation feature and to encourage visits to the Monument.

# **Freelance Evaluation Brief**

#### **Background and Context**

Sailor, Courtier, Member of Parliament and Mayor of Lymington, Admiral Sir Harry Burrard Neale was a significant personality in Lymington. This project has will revolve around the life and time of Sir Harry his role in the community and nationally. Using primary and secondary resource materials ad scholarship we explore his impact on the town of Lymington, his connections and naval career. We will develop a range of learning and engagement projects inspired by the research to share with children, families and the wider public. Integral to the project is the restoration, conservation and interpretation of the substantial Monument raised to Sir Harry in 1840, paid for by public subscription.

The Monument, a 22m tall Egyptionate obelisk consists of a 17m tall granite needle sitting on a stepped square plinth topped with an Egyptian cornice. The Monument is constructed of Large Dartmoor Blue Granite blocks from the Foggintor Quarry. Raised stone tablets with cast iron plaques are placed centrally on each of the faces of the plinth; each plaque provides information about Sir Harry's life. A scarab has been carved into each face of the needle just below the pyramidal top. The base of the monument is surrounded by Purbeck Limestone paving bounded by granite kerbs containing the stubs of the original railings which were removed during World War II. The railings surrounded the monument on four sides with tall corner posts terminating in a trident, one of which has survived in an adjoining garden. The Monument [add grid ref here] lies in the New Forest National Park and is listed Grade II\*

An engagement programme containing the Following elements has been put in place.

**Collaborative Project with Forest Forge Theatre Company** Elevate Summer Project. Each year a core group of secondary school students research, devise and present a theatrical interpretation of an important issues in their lives to secondary schools in the New Forest Area. In 2018 the theme of the project will be Developing the Franchise. The Burrard family had controlled the representation of Lymington in Parliament through patronage, also taking a seat themselves, for many generations.

At a time where significant decisions are being made through referenda eg Scottish Independence and Brexit - this is a live issue for this group. By exploring the history of this development they will better understand the arguments for change and how their decisions will impact on others lives. Working with historic framework and material is a new departure for the Elevate Project. Young people will develop an understanding of how historic events impact upon their lives.

Elevate is a unique programme that enables young people to model professional practice through forming a theatre company and creating and touring a piece of theatre to audiences of their peers. Through the programme participants develop an understanding of the variety of employment opportunities available front and back stage, and in the creation and development of works of art.

**St Barbe Museum Project Women in Lymington Society - Lady Neale and the wider community**. Born plain Harry Burrard, Admiral Sir Harry Burrard Neale died in Brighton 7th February 1840 aged 75. Unusually, by royal license, dated 8 April 1795, he had assumed the name and arms of Neale, on his marriage to Grace Elizabeth, daughter and coheiress of Robert Neale of Shaw House, Wiltshire.

On 25th Feb a public meeting in Lymingon agreed to open a subscription for a monument. The Annals of Walhampton [Ch XI] provides detailed description of this and a list of subscribers. 207 subscribers donated £1,482 towards the erection of the monument. Interestingly apx 23% of these subscribers were women donating apx 21% of the total.

History is generally written from the male perspective - the Monument subscribers list demonstrates that there was a cohort of active [and significant e.g. his wife] women in Lymington and the New Forest. Who were they, and what roles did they play in Lymington society - what was their influence? In the 100th anniversary year of women getting the vote, focus on the contribution of women in Lymington Society will provide the impetus for research and the development of a public outcome to be determined after research has taken place. Options might include exhibition, talks or activities in the museum, creative arts project or on line/social media project.

**Primary School and Family Activity Programme** - A range of family friendly and curriculum based activities offered to primary schools in Lymington and as holiday engagement activities

Launch of **Friends of Sir Harry** - The completion and conservation of the Monument will secure it for the future and the surrounding activities will add to the knowledge and profile of Sir Harry in the town. However in order to ensure that the Monument and the surrounding environment are maintained for public enjoyment, and the profile of Sir Harry remains high, sustained attention to both need to take place. A "friends" organisation is a vital part of both continually adding to the knowledge about Sir Harry and overseeing the maintenance of the site. Building on the voluntary activity and participation of the community payback teams during 2015/6 Burrard Neale 250 programme the launch of a formal "Friends" organisation will create a heritage organisation with purpose and a clear set of objectives.

## Aim of this Commission

Lymington and Pennington Town Council [L&PTC] wishes to appoint an experienced consultant work with the L&PTC and the Lymington Society to create an effective Evaluation programme for the project as a whole within the context of the requirements of the HLF for quantitative measures but also qualitative measures regarding the change in attitude to the sculpture, always controversial, over time.
