### **2.** Frequent Questions

- 1. Has a designer or other consultant been involved at any previous stage of the project? And if so, are they eligible to bid for this stage? No designer has been engaged; the design will ideally be produced in the shortlisting stage and then refined with interaction from the curatorial team post award.
- 2. Is the client providing interpretation and content including all final text and images? Initially the first stage determines skill, ability and relative indicative merit the short listed second stage will request a full mock up and design brief, with content, images and flavor text suggested by curatorial. Post award the exact contact will be agreed prior to engagement.
- 3. Can you confirm that the £72k is inclusive of design fees, exhibition build and installation? And does this figure exclude VAT? £72k is the full and final figure, including design fees, build, install and taxes.
- 4. How many parties are expected to be shortlisted to ITT stage? Depending on the quality of first stage submissions we anticipate three to five would be taken through to a short list stage.
- 5. Can the PQQ document be provided in editable format please? An editable version of the PQQ documentation has been attached to this email.
- 6. Please can you clarify the description in the 'involved parties' section is there another design team currently involved in designing an adjacent space? If so, is there no requirement for the designs to be complementary? Another design and build is being conducted in the main reception and entrance / orientation space therefore there may be times when internal resources / use of entrances / storage space etc must be shared with another design. In no way are the two projects intended to have any cross over. The two spaces are divided by a wall and walkway; the two spaces have no requirement to be complementary; they are being treated as separate and individual projects.
