## **1** Introduction and background

Community Led Local Development (CLLD) is a way of funding the delivery of local economic development using European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) and European Social Fund (ESF) grant. The two funds form part of the European Structural and Investment Fund Programme (ESIF) Programme for the period 2014 -2020.

Cornwall has been awarded £11.56m ESF and ERDF to support the delivery of the CLLD Local Development Strategies for West Cornwall, Coast to Coast, Atlantic & Moor and South & East Cornwall Local Action Group areas up until June 2022.

These calls are issued by Atlantic and Moor Local Action Group (AMLAG). AMLAG is a partnership group of voluntary and community, private and public sector organisations and representatives.

Cornwall Development Company (CDC) is the Accountable Body for CLLD in Cornwall. CDC will appraise and evaluate applications on behalf of AMLAG. The LAG will make the final decision on whether projects are invited to full application and ultimately whether they are approved or rejected.

AMLAG has developed five calls:

- AMLAG 01 Business Development & Growth
- AMLAG 02 Entrepreneurship in AMLAG
- AMLAG 03 Developing People
- AMLAG 04 Developing community and business workspace
- AMLAG 05 Atlantic & Moor Rural Services

This document outlines how to apply for CLLD funding under these calls.

NB: The CLLD programme is continually accepting projects that help to deliver the LAG strategy and projects falling outside the scope of these calls can apply independently – see <u>www.communityledcornwall.co.uk</u>











## 2 Call Timetable

In response to these calls for projects applicants are required to submit a Stage 1 Expression of Interest and, if approved, asked to proceed to a Stage 2 Full Application Form.

## **3** Scope of the Calls

There are five calls available. Each is explained in detail below.

All projects must support the delivery of specific strategic objectives set out in the Atlantic and Moor Local Action Group's Local Development Strategy. The Local Development Strategy is available on the CLLD website: www.communityledcornwall.co.uk

Projects can choose to deliver across more than one Activity. However, the appropriate Outputs should be selected and projects will be required to report on, and evidence, the achievement of Outputs separately under each Strategic Objective and Activity.











## 3.1 Call 1: AMLAG01: Business Development & Growth

Call Details	AMLAG01: Business Development & Growth
Call Context	The overarching aim of the AMLAG CLLD strategy is to provide better economic opportunities for residents and businesses in the area. It is therefore a key priority to encourage, and help facilitate, sustainable business growth in local companies that will provide increased opportunities for employment, improved economic situations for those living here, and a positive legacy.
Project Theme	Projects are invited that provide support local businesses to grow, create jobs, and to recruit from the AMLAG region.
	Projects are invited that support the growth of local business, the creation of jobs, and the recruitment of employees from the AMLAG region.
	Projects will take the form of either business support and consultancy, or capital investment activity. Support and consultancy will represent a minimum of 12 hours interaction with businesses.
Indicative Fund Allocation	Indicatively, the Local Action Group has allocated the following amount: £180,000 ERDF

Minimum Application Level	ERDF and ESF investment in the CLLD target areas is intended to make a significant impact on local employment, skills and enterprise.
	The minimum application level for funding is <b>£50,000</b>
	All potential applicant organisations are encouraged to work together with other local partners to generate new ideas, approaches and develop joint proposals.

Target Geography	The Local Development Strategy for Atlantic and Moor Local Action Group area has been approved by Government based on the bottom 30% on the Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) and a range of other criteria. The strategies focus on the most deprived areas of Cornwall.
1	CLLD activity should aim to target the Lower Super Output











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Areas (LSOAs) that fall within the 30% most deprived nationally. These target areas are called 'Core' areas and all eligible project activity and expenditure must benefit eligible individuals within these areas. There are 14 Core LSOAs across the areas targeted in this Call and 27 Functional areas.
Functional areas are not in the 30% most deprived but are next to the Core areas and have been included in the CLLD geography because of their links to key opportunities and to form a more coherent area.
For this call a minimum of 70% of Participants must come from the Core area.
For ERDF funded business development delivery, the applicant may or may not reside in a Core area, but to access the ERDF for capital costs applicants must have a base in the Core or Functional area. For example, a project with solely business development activity benefiting residents in a Core area can be delivered by an organisation from outside the defined area, but if the application includes the cost of refurbishing a small training room for training purposes (i.e. enabled by ERDF) then the building must be within a Core or Functional area.

## 3.2 Call 2: AMLAG 02 Entrepreneurship in AMLAG

Call Details	AMLAG02 Entrepreneurship in AMLAG
Call Context	The Atlantic and Moor CLLD area had 36,324 economically active residents in 2011 (Census), which was 68.4% of the working age population 16-74. This is higher than the Cornwall average of 66.7% below the England average of 69.9%.
	However, 20.5% of those in employment are self-employed which is below the Cornwall figure of 22.5%. The percentage is even lower in the Core LSOAs at 18.7%, 7,446 residents. (Census 2011)
	There is also a higher proportion of tourism related jobs in the Atlantic & Moor area which are typically seasonal, leaving a need for income from alternative sources of income outside the tourist season.
	Due to the lower levels of self-employment across the AMLAG area and the need to source alternative income it is proposed to identify and support projects that will enable the growth of self-employment in the AMLAG area.
Project Themes	There are two key themes to this call that aim to stimulate and support entrepreneurship across the Core areas of AMLAG.
	Applicants should consider how they will support the development of new entrepreneurs (including 'soft skills' development where required for eligible participants) as well as helping businesses less than 12 months old to develop further. Projects that support one or the other are also welcomed, but a combined approach is preferable.
	Partnership working and co-design approaches are encouraged, including genuine linking with local organisations to support engagement and/or legacy activities.
	Demonstration of innovative thinking in the applicant's exit strategy will be a priority.
	Route to self-employment: Projects are encouraged that raise aspiration in eligible beneficiaries and recruit them to a course (minimum of 24 hours interaction) where they will learn how to establish a business.
	Beneficiaries of the project may currently be in employment elsewhere, unemployed or economically inactive.

Objective 1
Businesses do not necessarily have the knowledge and skills
to access finance and funding through grant programmes, or take on employees. Some businesses are 'non growth' and fail to fit within existing programmes of support. Some businesses are quite vulnerable in viability terms and need support to help stabilise and develop their businesses. This objective seeks to work with such businesses to provide the appropriate support to address their particular business development issues. It also intends to work with larger employers and other businesses that could draw employees from the CLLD area if the potential employees have the appropriate support and development to help them move towards employment, including skills development.
People in some of the AMLAG CLLD clusters face some significant issues and have complex needs. In depth and











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	focused support will be needed to work with individuals to help them address some of the issues that need to be overcome even before reaching a point where training and skills development is possible. However overcoming issues has a skills development element in its own right. This objective recognises the potential of development through personal and community activities to help people move on a pathway towards employment and training and to recognise the skills development that people will achieve.
Activity H	Business advice and practical support.
Activity C	Support community-led and community based skills development; enabling and building capacity of individuals
Description	Activity H: Business mentors and coaches, access to finance, funding for equipment, marketing, community business support, business networking , transport to work and training Activity C: Basic skills, life skills training, peer-coaching, mentoring, re- training, one to one support linked to skills development, person centred skills for employability

## 3.3 Call 3: AMLAG 03 Developing People

Call Details	AMLAG03: Developing People
Call Context	Part of the aim of the Local Development Strategy for the Atlantic and Moor area is to provide better pathways to better economic opportunities for people and business by strengthening the local availability of employment, skills and training.
	The Cornwall Council Labour Market Assessment for August 2019 shows that there is a slightly higher percentage of people claiming Universal Credit in the North Cornwall Area (5.7% versus 5.5% for Cornwall), as well as a higher number of vacancies (1.2% / 486 vacancies). Of those claiming Universal Credit (3051 in North Cornwall) approximately 630 would be considered 'unemployed or inactive' and therefore eligible under this call.
Project Theme	Projects are invited that will provide support and deliver to those who are not in employment at the current time.
	We recognise the limited number of employment, skills and training opportunities in this part of Cornwall which is partly due to the difficulties of rurality and small population centres. However, we believe there is scope to develop new types of delivery with very localised activity, or innovative approaches to engaging people and supporting them to access opportunities to develop themselves.
	Projects will work with those who are 'unemployed' or inactive' and will move people into or closer to the labour market. Links with employers (local and national) will be a crucial element of the projects as will support for participants to access the opportunities.
	<ul> <li>In particular:</li> <li>Projects that demonstrate a link between local employers staffing needs and the proposed training offer will be a higher priority for support.</li> <li>Projects where skills development is provided to eligible participants in a way that also aims to address the most acute issues identified in the IMD will also be a higher priority for support.</li> <li>Applicants may plan to deliver in one or more of the AMLAG target areas.</li> <li>Applicants will also need to demonstrate how they plan to tailor their support for each area taking into account the differing demographics in the different parts of the area.</li> </ul>

#### 3.4 <u>Call 4: AMLAG 04 Developing community and</u> business workspace

business workspace	
Call Details	AMLAG04: Developing community and business workspace
Call Context	An element of the AMLAG LDS is to drive business growth in the area, through the encouragement of increased investment in the existing facilities of local companies, to promote sustainable growth and job creation.
	Furthermore, anecdotal evidence suggests there is ongoing demand for communal co-working and hot desking facilities in AMLAG, fuelled by the prevalence of entrepreneurs in the area. First hand evidence from current AMLAG funding applicants confirms the business growth benefits that such facilities offer including;
	<ul> <li>Increased productivity (over homeworking)</li> <li>Ideas exchange &amp; Networking</li> <li>New business referrals</li> <li>Cost management</li> </ul>
	The LDS also states a desire to enable community development through the enhancement of community facilities, their functionality and usage. Such activity will also lend itself to the programme's legacy aims in building community capacity, and encouraging community cohesion through their ongoing use.
Project Theme	Projects are sought that create or refurbish buildings for new or increased commercial activity that provides an economic benefit to residents of the Core areas of AMLAG. This may take the form of the construction of new, or the refurbishment of existing, business units, coworking spaces, hot desking facilities or any other form of workspace that meets the local need.
	We are looking for:
	<ul> <li>Projects that provide communal coworking facilities which are accessible to new enterprises and 'kitchen table' businesses looking to expand into premises.</li> </ul>

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## 3.5 Call 5: AMLAG 05 Atlantic & Moor Rural Services

Call Details	AMLAG05: Atlantic & Moor Rural Services
Call Context	While technically there are only 2 villages across the AMLAG area, Tintagel and Lanivet, the remaining target areas comprise of market and coastal towns which are typically rural in nature compared to urban settlements. The characteristics that support this are the lower population levels (e.g. most towns in Cornwall are smaller than English villages such as Bradfield, Lancing and Kidlington); as well as reduced access to services, in part due to lacking a critical mass of people typically required to sustain them through local taxation, direct charging or local fundraising. A significant example of this is local transport options; without access to a car it is very difficult to get around North Cornwall.
	Legacy is a crucial aspect of AMLAG's strategy to economically develop the area and creating new or developing existing infrastructure for the delivery of services is a very important part of this.
	As such, this call aims to support the creation or development of rural services where a need can be demonstrated and a business case for financial sustainability is proposed.
	This call is not prescriptive regarding the nature of the services that will be supported, but projects must be eligible and demonstrate a benefit to AMLAG's core areas.
Project Theme	Innovative projects are sought that propose the implementation of new services or the development of an existing service where there is a clear and demonstrated economic benefit to one or more of AMLAG's core areas.
	Local transport issues should be considered intrinsically with all projects and creative solutions are encouraged.
	Applicants will seek to develop services that enable local residents of CLLD core neighbourhoods to access support, services and opportunities, including accessing affordable energy.

This objective therefore seeks to address an issue and find opportunities with local community economic benefit.	
	Objective 4: Access to transport has consistently emerged as a cross cutting theme, relevant to businesses and people. Finding new solutions to transport issues is critical in this very rural CLLD area in order to help people access employment and training and deal with issues such as cost, reliability and flexibility to be able to cope with differing working patterns. The Local Action Group are also keen to consider projects that include innovative ways of delivering outcomes, particularly where they involve partnership working and collaboration, which could be assistance in forming co-operatives for example.











Projects should also consider how they will contribute to the strategies' aims as well as local outputs and impacts relevant to the project. These might include, but are not limited, to the following:

- Positive progression towards employment (including self-employment), training, volunteering or other outcome;
- Improved skills, capacity and local leadership to meet local needs;
- Individuals have the confidence, capacity, self-belief and inspiration to take steps towards and move into self-employment, employment, training or other appropriate progression

Successful applicants will be required to participate in project and programme level evaluations as required by the Local Action Groups. As well as collecting core ERDF and ESF output and results information, project applicants and delivery partners will be required to monitor individual beneficiary progress using an agreed methodology. This will be complemented by CLLD beneficiary and leaver forms to capture important information and data that will be used to evaluate the wider impacts of the programme.

Further guidance and support on monitoring and evaluation will be provided to projects at the full application and contracting stages.

## **5** Evaluation

Applicants must fully complete the Expression of Interest which will be appraised by the Accountable Body.

Invitations to progress to the Full Application stage do not in any way indicate or constitute an offer of a grant.

Once the Expression of Interest appraisal is complete, the Accountable Body will seek Local Action Group approval to prioritise the applications they wish to proceed with. Only those applications that the Accountable Body and Local Action Group agree should proceed will be invited to submit a Full Application.

At the Full Application stage further detail on the project proposal will be sought, including consideration of additional appraisal criteria. Subsequently, only those Full Applications that the Accountable Body and LAG agree should proceed will be approved.

## 6 Eligibility rules

ERDF and ESF eligibility rules apply to all project expenditure, including match funding. A list of eligible and ineligible costs is available from the website, by emailing <u>CLLD@cornwalldevelopmentcompany.co.uk</u> or from the national ESF and ERDF eligibility rules.

If successful at the Full Application stage, applicants will enter into a Funding Agreement with the Accountable Body and must abide by the standard terms and conditions. Once a Funding Agreement has been issued it should be signed and returned within 30 days, unless agreed otherwise with the Accountable Body.

### 8 Eligible applicants

The ESF and ERDF eligibility rules set out which types of organisations are eligible to apply for European funding. These include:

- Voluntary / community organisations;
- Not for Profit organisations;
- Registered charities;
- Higher and Further Education Institutions;
- Statutory and non-statutory public funded organisations/bodies;
- Private sector organisations.

Due Diligence checks may also be undertaken at the Expression of Interest stage.

Applicants must be legally constituted both at the point of submitting an Expression of Interest and signing a Funding Agreement. If the application is approved the applicant organisation will enter into a legally binding Funding Agreement and therefore will carry the liability for ensuring that the terms and conditions of the Funding Agreement are met.

If there is more than one organisation applying for the funds, a lead organisation must be selected to become the applicant (and grant recipient) with the other organisation(s) acting as delivery partner(s). In this situation the applicant











would be responsible and liable for the delivery partner(s) and ensuring the project is operating compliantly. The applicant is responsible for establishing appropriate agreements with its delivery partner(s).

During the application process the Accountable Body, on behalf of the LAG, will consider the applicant's track record, both positive and negative. If the applicant has been involved in the delivery of previous grant programmes and any irregularities have been identified, the Accountable Body will expect to see what steps have been taken to ensure that the risk of further irregularities in the future is mitigated. It is acknowledged that some organisations will be new to European funding and will not have a track record.

### 9 Intervention rate and match funding

ESF and ERDF investment must not be used to replace existing funding sources or duplicate activity.

European funding must enable activity to take place that would not otherwise happen or to increase the scope, scale or intensity of activity.

For all outputs except C1 Enterprise Supported and C5 New Enterprise Supported it is expected there will be no state aid.

- The maximum ERDF intervention rate is 72% of the total eligible project costs.
- The maximum ESF intervention rate is 80% of the total eligible project costs.

Where state aid does apply, the intervention rate may be lower than this.

The funding awarded will be the minimum in order for the project to proceed.

The remaining funds must come from other eligible non-European sources, which may include:

- Other public funding;
- Community foundations and trusts;
- Lottery distributors;
- Voluntary and community sector sources;
- Private sector contributions.

During the application and appraisal process applicants will need to satisfy the Accountable Body and LAG that they have, or are able to put in place, eligible match funding for the balance of costs.











ESF and ERDF are typically paid quarterly in arrears and expenditure must be defrayed prior to the submission of any grant claims to the Accountable Body. Applicants will be asked to demonstrate how they are able to cash flow the project. By exception projects can be considered for monthly claims in arrears, however, this must be requested and evidence of need for this arrangement provided.

## **10 Project timescales**

Applicants should plan to deliver activity for a minimum of six months (e.g. for pilot projects) up to June 2022. However, the Local Action Group reserves the right to vary the minimum and maximum durations, upwards or downwards.

Expressions of Interest approved through this call for projects will normally be expected to:

- Submit a detailed and complete Full Application by the deadline given if formally selected at Expression of Interest stage. Projects which fail to meet this deadline may be deselected;
- Commence delivery (defraying ERDF/ESF eligible costs) as soon as is practically possible and within three months of formal approval as a maximum. Projects which fail to meet this deadline may be deselected, and
- Complete their project activities by June 2022.

11 Cross cutting themes – Equal opportunities and sustainable development

The Local Development Strategies are each supported by 3 key cross-cutting themes as follows:

- Demonstrating sustainability, with projects having at least a neutral, and preferably a positive environmental impact. They must also demonstrate that they can deliver a sustainable business model which will reduce the need for continued public support beyond the lifetime of the programme, as well as a lasting legacy post-completion.
- Actively promote and implement **equal opportunities**, demonstrating a positive equalities impact. All projects supported must take account of their impact on people with protected characteristics.
- Embed **innovation** in project design and delivery, for example at business level new services and working practices, and at community level social innovations that seek new solutions to social issues. In this way innovation will help achieve a community legacy.

All applications selected as a result of this call will be required to demonstrate at the Full Application stage how the Cross Cutting Themes will be addressed in the











project design, development and implementation. The LAG's CLLD policies for equal opportunities and sustainable development are available on the programme website.

## 12 Partnership working, additionality and value for money

Additionality is a core principle of European funding. Applicants must be able to demonstrate that the activity paid for by European funding adds value to new or existing activity, and contributes to local and domestic priorities.

European funding cannot support activities that duplicate existing provision or services within the CLLD area. Applications will need to identify and evidence how the beneficiaries will access and use the service, and demonstrate that the project will not displace other activity available locally.

The Local Action Groups are keen to consider projects that include innovative ways of delivering outcomes, particularly where they involve partnership working and collaboration, which could include assistance in forming co-operatives for example.

### 13 State aid and revenue generation

State Aid is the use of state funding or resources to support businesses (or commercial undertakings). The decisive factor in determining whether an organisation is an undertaking is not the nature of the entity itself, but the nature of the activities it carries out. If it carries out an economic activity, selling goods or services on a market, it is an undertaking.

In order to ensure that all activities supported through CLLD are lawful, State Aid will be initially assessed by the Accountable Body at the Expression of Interest stage. If clarification on State Aid is required, this will be requested from the project applicant at the Full Application stage. All applicants must satisfy themselves that State Aid regulations are complied with and consider taking legal advice.

#### **14 Procurement regulations**

Project costs must be procured in line with National (including Public Procurement Regulation 2015) and European Union regulations.











Procurement will be subject to audit and verification and any irregularity will result in a financial penalty of up to 100% of the grant paid. Robust and transparent procurement is required to ensure that grant recipients:

- Consider value for money;
- Maximise efficient use of public money;
- Maintain competitiveness and fairness across the European Union.

It is strongly recommended that applicants review their own procurement procedures to ensure they are in line with National ESIF Procurement requirements.
