Statement of Requirement for the Provision of Independent Specialist Advice and Assurance (ISAA) to MOD Airfield Wildlife Control (AWC) Policy

<u>Ref</u><u>Requirement</u>

<u>A</u> <u>General Requirements</u>

A.1 Scope of Requirement

A.1.a The MOD needs to minimise the effect upon its aircraft operations caused by collisions with birds and wildlife. The MOD has a legal responsibility to ensure that its operations are conducted in as safe a manner as is reasonably practicable. Regulatory Article (RA) 3270 and the Manual of Aerodrome Design and Safeguarding (MADS) provide regulation, guidance and policy on the requirements of Airfield Wildlife Control. An Independent Specialist advisor is required to provide advice and assurance which forms part of this process.

A.2 Definitions

A.2.a In addition to the definitions detailed in the Terms and Conditions of the Contract the following definitions shall also apply. Where the definitions below contrast to those detailed in the Terms and Conditions of the Contract then the definitions within the Terms and Conditions of the Contract shall take precedence.

<u>Definition</u> Contractor's Personal Use	Interpretation Any use of MOD furnished property, facilities or equipment intended for the primary benefit of the Contractor or the Contractor's Personnel which is contrary to the MOD's interests is considered personal use.
Contractor's Personnel	Any employees, including sub-contractors or other agents working on behalf of the Contractor, shall be deemed the Contractor's Personnel.
Designated Officer	The Designated Officer is the MOD representative responsible for the Requirement and is as defined at Box 2 of DEFFORM 111 of this Contract.

A.5 Site

Ref Requirement

A.5.a The Site for the delivery of all services is MOD Airfields on mainland UK and some overseas territories; Including but not limited to Falkland Islands, Gibraltar and Cyprus. The term aerodrome is defined in MAA02

A.6 Security

- A.6.a The Contractor is to ensure that all of the Contractor's personnel have Security Check (SC) clearance. Contractor's personnel without SC clearance will not be permitted access to MOD facilities.
- A.6.b All information related to or generated by this Contract is to be treated in the appropriate manner in accordance with Government Security Classifications. The classification of the material to be handled shall not exceed OFFICIAL-SENSITIVE-COMMERCIAL in nature.
- A.6.c All personal data processed under this Contract is to be treated in accordance with the Data Protection Act 1998.

A.7 Site Access

- A.7.a Where access to a MOD site is required, the contractor will be advised of the access procedures for that site, including proofs of identity required.
- A.7.b The security requirements at each unit may vary. The Contractor is to liaise with Unit security staff to ensure their personnel comply.

A.8 Safety and Environmental Provisions

A.8.a When on the Site the Contractor is to comply with all MOD Safety, Health and Environmental Protection regulations and policy.

A.9 Hours of Operation and Times of Delivery

A.9a Where attendance of the contractor is required, the contract will be advised.

A.10 Quality Assurance

A.10.a The Contractor shall provide appropriate evidence of certification ISO 9001:2015 provided by a third party certification body which has been accredited by the United Kingdom Accreditation Service (UKAS) or by a signatory to the International Accreditation Forum-Multi Lateral Agreement (IAF-MLA) or internal equivalent Quality Assurance policy.

A.11 Contract Monitoring

- A.11.a For the purposes of contract monitoring, representatives of the Contractor will routinely report to the DO on the performance of the Contract.
- A.11.b The Contractor is responsible for the performance of the Contract by any sub-contractors or other agents working on behalf of the Contractor. The Contractor is to deal with any issues relating to any sub-contractors or other agents working on behalf of the Contractor, this however does not exclude sub-contractors or other agents working on behalf of the Contractor from attending any Contract Monitoring meeting or contributing to any report where it is appropriate for such sub-contractors or other agents to do so.
- A.11.c If any sub-contractors or other agents working on behalf of the Contractor are found unsuitable, for whatever reason, the Contractor is to engage with the relevant sub-contractors or other agents to broker a resolution.

- B.1 Provide advice to HQ Air Cmd on safeguarding issues associated with the assessment of risks of Airfield Wildlife Control associated with the commercial, industrial or domestic developments, as notified by Defence Infrastructure Organisation (DIO) (Safeguarding) or other interested parties.
- B.2 Carry out in association with HQ Air Cmd (BM) staff, periodic independent standards checks of the Airfield Wildlife Control units at MOD aerodromes (contracted and MOD personnel).

B.3 Carry out in association with HQ Air Cmd (BM) staff the monitoring and recording of AWCU Monthly Reports.

<u>Quantity</u> Generally, a

response will be provided within 14 days of a request but as required to meet the requirement.

Standard of Performance

Advice given is normally to be in written report format, however it may be necessary to attend meetings in person so that advice can be offered in open forum debate.

Written reports containing recommendations, where appropriate, are to be raised and forwarded to HQ Air Cmd (BM).

The Contractor shall assess an effective and efficient bird and wildlife control system in accordance with the Manual of Air Traffic Management (MATM), Manual of Airfield Design and Safeguarding (MADS), RAF BM Orders and Technical Bulletin 97/34. The specified references shall be deemed to imply the current editions as from time to time amended.

Written reports containing recommendations, where appropriate, are to be raised and forwarded to HQ Air Cmd (BM).

The Contractor shall assess an effective and efficient bird and wildlife control system in accordance with the Manual of Air Traffic Management (MATM), Manual of Airfield Design and Safeguarding All MOD AWCUs are required to undergo a PSC approximately every 12 months but no greater than every 18 months.

PSCs are conducted at a rate of two per month (approx. 20 pa) and normally take 1 day on site with additional time for travelling and report writing. A schedule of visits should be provided with a forecast of visits. This schedule is to cover a 12 month period in advance. The frequency of visits has been tailored by the incumbent to assure the suitable level of PSC support and is therefore subject to change over time. The Contractor should have sufficient knowledge of the ornithological situations (potential background populations of hazardous species) to inform the selection process.

Draft Periodic Standards Check (PSC) Reports are to be forwarded to Battlespace Management Force HQ A3/5 SO2 Airfields within 14 days of the visit.
