Competition in Connections

The Budget Estimate is based upon NGED undertaking both the contestable and non-contestable connection works. You are able to seek competitive prices for some or all of the contestable elements.

You have the option to appoint an Independent Connection Provider (ICP) or Independent Distribution Network Operator (IDNO) to carry out some of the connection works, referred to as the Contestable Connection Works. Any connection works that can only be undertaken by NGED are referred to as Non-contestable Connection Works. See our enclosed Budget Estimate guide for more information.

Proposed Connection Works

Our estimate of the connection charge is for providing the following works:

Estimate for NGED to Supply and install a single phase service (18kVA) with mains extension required:

- 1) Install 65m of 3c 185 WC
- Install 30m of Multicore Service (3c 25mm S/C - 18kVA)
- 3) Install Multicore cut out (SNE)
- 4) Install one way service joint
- 5) Install Branch joint to make live

Please note that these proposals are based upon a desk top provisional investigation and no site visit or detailed study has been carried out.

The estimate does not include costs for any reinforcement or diversionary work that may be required, or for any environmental, or stability studies which may also be necessary, although these are generally only required for larger capacity connections.

Progression to Connection Offer stage

This Budget Estimate is not a legally binding contract, but sets out the amount we reasonably estimate we would require you to pay for the connection works under a formal Connection offer.

If you would like us to undertake a more detailed analysis, including an assessment of any network reinforcement required we can provide a formal Connection Offer. Further information regarding how to apply is provided in our enclosed summary guide.

Upon receipt of your application we will carry out detailed network studies to finalise the design of the connection works (and any associated reinforcement works), and provide a Connection Offer detailing the works required, the associated costs, timescales, payment terms and conditions for the connection.

A guide to help you understand your Budget Estimate and to outline your options for obtaining an offer to connect to NGED's Distribution System

Thank you for requesting a Budget Estimate for a connection to our distribution system. This guide is designed to help you understand the basis upon which the Budget Estimate is prepared and to highlight the options available to you should you wish to proceed to a formal offer for connection (the 'Connection Offer').

Budget Estimate

Provision of a Budget Estimate is a free of charge service, the purpose of which is to give you an indication of the likely cost of your connection(s). We do not carry out any detailed design work and the assessment is carried out as a desktop exercise that does not take account of any site specific considerations. You should note that the estimate that we provide at this stage may vary significantly from the price subsequently calculated in any Feasibility Study or Connection Offer. This is because it does not include the costs for any necessary network reinforcement, changed circumstances, or other influencing factors that come to light when the detailed investigation is undertaken. A Budget Estimate is not a formal offer for connection and cannot be accepted by you.

Exclusions from the Budget Estimate

Costs associated with the following activities are **NOT** included in the Budget Estimate:

- The diversion of our existing assets (if any) or any third party apparatus that is required
- Any associated reinforcement works
- Any on-site excavation and reinstatement
- The inclusion of any payment required in accordance with the Electricity (Connection Charges) Regulations 2017
- Any associated civil works, for example the provision of a substation plinth
- Detailed earthing studies are your responsibility
- Permits required under the Traffic Management Act 2004
- Out-of-hours working
- Legal requirements or consents
- Disturbing loads, for example motors, welders, electric vehicle chargers, heat pumps, etc.
- Any associated disconnections
- Any associated temporary supply

- Final competitive tenders and increases in labour, contract, or material costs
- Any required surveys, including any site survey
- Testing and commissioning (where applicable) that is undertaken in accordance with Engineering Recommendation G99 that must be witnessed by us
- Any impact on the transmission system and/or NGESO requirements arising

Application of the Electricity (Connection Charges) Regulations 2017 (ECCRs)

If your new electricity connection will connect to and utilise assets installed and paid for in respect to a previous connection the ECCRs may come in to effect. The ECCRs empower us to recover from you a proportion of those costs and refund the initial connection customer. Any calculated ECCR payments will be included in your Connection Offer.

Ways to proceed

If you want to take your enquiry further there are a number of ways you can proceed. You can request:

- A Feasibility Study; or
- A formal Connection Offer; or
- A Study & Offer quotation (Distributed Energy Resources (DER) only – limitations apply)

Feasibility Study

A Feasibility Study is generally used for more complex connections and involves a more detailed assessment that may consider a number of connection options. When more than one viable option is available we will provide estimated costs for each option. Once you have decided which option you would like to progress you can apply for a Connection Offer. There is a charge associated for this work; therefore we recommend you speak to your NGED contact first to find out more.

Formal Connection Offer

If you request a Connection Offer we will undertake a more detailed assessment of the network, design the solution, including any reinforcement required and calculate the associated connection charge. The Connection

Offer will include two options for acceptance. The first option will include a price for us to undertake all the connection works.

The second option will include a price for us to undertake just the works that only we are allowed to do; the 'non-contestable works'. You can get a competitive quotation for the remaining works; the 'contestable works' and may appoint an accredited Independent Connection Provider (ICP) to undertake these works. For further information please see our section on Competitions in Connections.

The Connection Offer is open for acceptance for 90 days and includes all our terms and conditions for connection. Once accepted it will become a binding contract between us.

The Connection Offer will include charges for the costs we incur in preparing it. For those Connection Offers that include an element of works at extra high voltage (22kV and above) we will charge you for the costs incurred regardless of whether or not you accept the Connection Offer (see 'Assessment & Design Fees' below).

Study & Offer Process

If you are unsure of the capacity you wish to connect, a Study & Offer quotation allows you to assess the capacity options available without submitting multiple formal applications. Please note that this option is only available for generation connections with export capacity of 5MVA and above.

Each application allows up to three different capacity options you may require. We conduct a Feasibility Study for the approximate cost and works required to connect the generation to our network. This includes an indication of any reinforcement or diversionary works that may be required.

The standard application form should be completed as well as an additional covering form for the Study & Offer process. For more information

Assessment & Design Fees (A&D Fees)

If your proposed electricity connection requires work at 22kV and above we will charge you for the time we spend preparing the connection offer in accordance with the Electricity (Connection Offer Expenses) Regulations 2018, (the 'A&D Fee'). We will require payment even if you do not accept the Connection Offer. The charge covers costs we reasonably incur when assessing the impacts of the proposed connection on the distribution/transmission system, designing the connection (including any

reinforcement works) and preparing the Connection Offer. Further information may be found on our website:

Competition in Connections (CiC)

We offer a complete and comprehensive connection service but, if you wish, there are other companies you may ask to undertake some of the work known as the 'contestable' work. ('Non-contestable' works are the elements of the connections work which must be completed by NGED). An Independent Connection Provider (ICP) can build electricity networks for adoption by us or by an Independent Distribution Network Operator (IDNO).

An IDNO is a company that can construct electricity networks, arranges connections to NGED's network or adopt networks built by ICPs then retains ownership of and be responsible for the operation,

repair and maintenance of that new network.

The ICP must be registered with Lloyds Register EMEA under the National Electricity Registration Scheme (NERS) and they are required to work in accordance with the national framework and NGED documents that provide specifications for design, material procurement and installation and recording of assets.

The new connection (up to the start of your electrical installation) will be adopted by us (where no IDNO is involved) and become part of our electricity network on satisfactory final inspection, testing and connection. We will own the new connection from that time, and will take responsibility for future operation, repair, maintenance and replacement (subject to any guarantee requirements of the Adoption Agreement).

You must excavate by hand digging trial holes to establish the actual positions of all cables before any mechanical excavation works commence. Please contact your Site Manager who will help you ensure that all your works are carried out safely and in accordance with Health and Safety Guidance Instruction HSG47 – Avoiding Danger From Underground Services.

Legal Permissions and Consents

We have a legal obligation to provide new electricity connections, as well as to maintain and upgrade the existing distribution system in our area. For a new connection we need land rights to install and thereafter use, maintain and renew our equipment on privately owned land. When this is necessary we secure our equipment by legal agreement (Wayleaves and/or Deeds) with landowners. This helps to ensure that the equipment stays where it has been placed and can be maintained when necessary.

All land rights/legal and consents must be in place before we install and energise a new connection to our network. It is important that customers/developers are aware that the statutory process for acquiring compulsory land rights can be time consuming, it is not guaranteed to be successful and could be extremely costly. For this reason you should be prepared and if a third party is involved in the scheme, to start the negotiations before instructing us to pursue the compulsory land rights process.

Please note that we cannot energise our equipment until land rights are legally secured.

National Grid Electricity System Operator (NGESO) – The Electricity Transmission System

Larger installations, (typically generation requiring 1MW of export capacity and above and demand requiring 10MW of import capacity and above) may have an impact on the National Grid Electricity System Operator (NGESO) transmission system. Although we may flag any existing limiting network conditions in your Budget Estimate, it does not take account of any impact of the proposed connection(s) on the transmission system, including the outcome of any modification application that we may be required to submit to NGESO.

We may be required to request a 'Statement of Works' from NGESO in accordance with section 6.5.5, or a Modification in accordance with section 6.9 of the Connection and Use of System Code (the "CUSC") in order to ascertain the effect of the proposed connection on the transmission system. On receipt of this request, NGESO will consider, in accordance with the CUSC, whether or not a formal modification application is required.



ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Charges

Income Offsets

From 1 April 2020, income offsets will no longer be deducted from requisitions. Instead, the payment will apply to every first-time new connection (clean or waste) to the Company's network and will be deducted from infrastructure charges. The income offset is calculated on a per property basis for a domestic house and will be deducted from the infrastructure charges payable for the connection. Where the building is not for a single dwelling a different scenario, then the relevant multiplier that is used for previous site usage will be used as a means for calculating the income offset.

If you receive a quotation that has a negative value due to income offsets, we will require written confirmation (we will accept an email) that you accept the quotation and the quote reference number you are accepting.

Infrastructure

Infrastructure Charges are separate from and additional to connection charges. They are permitted under Section 146 of The Water Industry Act 1991. Infrastructure Charges need to be paid by anyone who wishes to build or develop a property, and are used to cover the cost of the extra demand on our existing network. This ensures that the extra demand does not reduce the level of service currently enjoyed by other customers in the area.

They are applicable to the following whether connecting directly or indirectly:

- Building of new domestic premises, including permanent caravans
- Additional new premises on the site of demolished premises
- Conversion of existing building into additional units/dwellings
- First time connection of an existing property
- New commercial and industrial units

There are similar infrastructure charges for connection to the sewerage network. If your new property is serviced for sewerage by South West Water, we will also quote these at the same time as the water infrastructure charges.

Installation

Disinfection

In order to safeguard water quality and public health, it is a requirement that your private supply pipe(s) are disinfected (chlorinated) and tested in certain circumstances, before a connection(s) is allowed to the water main. Disinfection must be carried out to 'BS EN 806' to ensure there is no detriment to public health. If you require more information regarding this process, please contact us on 0800 083 1821 or see the chlorination guidance on our website at www.southwestwater.co.uk/waterconnections. PLEASE DO NOT DISINFECT THE SERVICE PIPE(S) UNTIL YOU HAVE BEEN GIVEN A CONNECTION DATE FROM SOUTH WEST WATER.

Water Pressure and Storage

For household and non-household connections, you may wish to consider tank storage and/or booster within your private system. We'll provide a minimum of 7 metres static head, which meets with the requirements of the Water Industry Act 1991, (We can't guarantee pressure above 7 metres static head) which is the standard for domestic use.

You should also keep in mind the following points:

- Water pressure will vary depending on the season and time of day
- Water supplies may be interrupted for planned (normally with notice) or emergency maintenance (often without notice)
- We may alter the pressure in the network to meet with demands (but we'll always maintain the minimum)



The designer/installer should install the system in accordance with the Water Supply (Water Fittings) Regulations 1999 and Notification provided prior to installation. If you choose to install a plumbing system directly from the mains water supply and we alter the pressure, we are not liable for any failure of the plumbing system or for the consequences of not installing a storage based system.

Traffic Management

Footpath Closure

A footpath closure is required in order to for us to install your new water connection. The Highway Authority request a minimum of 14 weeks notice for a planned footpath closure before your water connection can take place. A footpath closure will be requested once the terms of the application are satisfied (including payment) and a request for a connection date received. Please ensure you include these time scales into your planning and/or build program.

Traffic Lights

There is a highway requirement for us to plan your new water connection with traffic lights. Planning traffic lights setup can take a minimum of four weeks notice with the Highway Authority before the work can take place. Please ensure you include these time scales into your planning and/or build program.



Connection and payment options

Acceptance of the quotation

Full security payment will be required before a connection to our water mains can commence. The quickest method is payment by Credit/Debit card.

Please note other pre connection conditions must be satisfied before we are able to commence planning a new connection. A Road Closure Notice will not be served on receipt of a payment alone.

We offer three different methods of payment:

Credit/Debit card

To pay by credit or debit card please call our Helpline on 0800 083 1821 between the hours of 8:30am and 4:00pm Monday to Friday.

American Express (Amex) and Visa Electron are not accepted.

Cheque

If you would prefer to pay by cheque, please make it payable to South West Water. You will need to write your work request number on the back along with any plot numbers that you are paying for (if applicable) and send it to:

You will need to allow 10 working days for the payment to clear.

Connection Only

If excavation; pipe laying; traffic management; and reinstatement have been included in the works within this quote, then you have the option to undertake this work yourself. This is called a connection only and there is a fixed rate charge for this connection option. Please contact the New Connections Team for further information.

All Section 104 agreements will need to be supported by a bond. This bond should be 10% of the construction costs of the scheme.

Included within the charges are:

- 1. The administration fee covers administration of the process including the provision of maintenance and vesting certificates.
- 2. Vetting covers the review of the drawings in accordance with the specification.
- 3. The vetting cost is based on one submission and two re-submissions. Should there be any subsequent re-submissions further fees will apply.
- 4. Inspection fees are based ongoing inspections during construction, maintenance inspection and one revisit for remedial inspection. Should there be any subsequent re-inspections further fees will apply.

- 1. The developer should maintain the integrity of separate surface water sewer systems and is responsible for any blockages, pumping station breakdown, cross-connections, etc., and any impact (e.g., flooding or pollution, etc.) up to the time the sewers are adopted.
- 2. The developer should include in their S104 Application a plan for approval by the sewerage company to demonstrate how sediment and other debris will be managed to avoid any sediment or debris being discharged into the proposed drainage system, any public sewer or a surface water body. The developer should comply with this plan at all times during construction and during any maintenance carried out prior to adoption.

Section 4: Infrastructure charges

The infrastructure charge is authorised under Section 146(2) of the Water Industry Act 1991. Charges have been set to recover the costs of network reinforcement involving new development from those making demand on the water and sewerage systems rather than from existing customers of the water and sewerage companies.

Section 5: Income Offsets

From 1 April 2020, income offsets no longer be deducted from requisitions. It should also be noted that from 1 April 2025 income offsets will not be available in line with the Ofwat Charging Rules.

Instead, the payment will apply to every first-time new connection (clean or waste) to the Company's network and will be deducted from infrastructure charges.

The income offset is calculated on a per property basis for a domestic house and will be deducted from the infrastructure charges payable for the connection. Where the building is not for a single dwelling a different scenario, then the relevant multiplier that is used for previous site usage will be used as a means for calculating the income offset.

Payment of income offsets

Income offsets may only be applied once. Therefore, if they have already been deducted as part of one the following examples, they will not be deducted again: -

- b. As part of a previous Asset Payment to an SLP



Income offsets will only be offset against infrastructure charges where the individual plot connection is made on or after the 1 April 2020.

Section 6: Environmental Incentives

South West Water are offering to reduce the water infrastructure charge for new development by 75%. The reduced rate will apply to infrastructure charges for developments which meet the specified criteria.

Developers will need to demonstrate, using the building regulations calculator that:

- properties are built with water efficient fittings and fixed appliances.
- mean water usage would not exceed the potential consumption of 110 litres per person, per day rather than the 125 litres per person, per day expected in the relevant Building Regulations.

Applications for this scheme will need to be submitted at the same time as the application for the relevant service.

Please note late or retrospective applications for the sustainable infrastructure charge cannot be accepted onto the scheme and it is currently only available on clean water infrastructure charges.

Section 7: Surface Water Run-off Destination Hierarchy

The statutory Water and Sewerage Undertaker supports the Planning Policy Guidance for Flood Risk & Coastal Change statement. The applicant must demonstrate how its proposed development will have separate foul and surface water drainage systems and not be detrimental to existing infrastructure, the public and environment (and that any provisions for protecting infrastructure have been agreed with SWWL as service-provider). You will need to demonstrate that the prospective surface run-off will discharge as high up the hierarchy of drainage options as is reasonably practicable (with evidence that the Run-off Destination Hierarchy has been addressed, and reasoning as to why any preferred disposal route is not reasonably practicable): In all cases, where there is a risk of flooding the development will be made safe and flood risk not increased elsewhere.

- Water re-use (smart water butts/rainwater harvesting etc.)
 Provide written evidence as to why water re-use practises are not a viable option for your proposal.
- 2. Discharge into the ground (infiltration); or where not reasonably practicable, Provide written evidence as to why Infiltration devices, including Soakaways, Swales, Infiltration Basins and Filter Drains do not meet the design standards as specified in either H3 Building Regulation standards for areas less than 100m2. Soakaways

serving larger areas must meet the design standard specified in BS EN 752-4 (para 3.36) or BRE Digest 365 Soakaway Design.

- 3. Discharge to a surface waterbody; or where not reasonably practicable, Provide written evidence for refusal of discharge consent from owner of water body (Environment Agency, Local Authority, Riparian Owner etc)
- Discharge to a surface water sewer, highway drain, or another drainage system; or where not reasonably practicable, Provide written evidence for refusal of discharge to drainage system (Highway Authority, Environment Agency, Local Authority, Private ownership)
- Discharge to a combined sewer. (Subject to Sewerage Undertaker carrying out capacity evaluation)
 South West Water will carry out a hydraulic capacity review of the combined sewerage network before permission will be granted to discharge to the combined sewer

In relation to discharges of surface water drainage of streets, please refer to Sewer Sector Guidance (Design and Construction Guidance) and in particular section A8 (an extract of which is below).

A8 DRAINAGE OF STREETS

- 1. The sewerage company is not obliged to accept runoff from newly-constructed streets into the public sewer system. The developer should note that acceptance of this runoff into the works and, ultimately, the public sewer system, is only by agreement, which will not be unreasonably withheld.
- 2. Where the developer wishes to connect drainage from streets to a surface water sewer or a combined sewer, they should discuss this with the sewerage company as early as possible as the specific consent of the sewerage company will be required in advance. The connection of drainage from streets to a foul sewer will not be permitted.
- 3. The connection of runoff from publicly-adoptable highways to a public sewer is regulated by the Water Industry Act 1991 Section 115. Some sewerage companies may have a separate formal agreement for such discharges. This agreement is formally between the highway authority and the sewerage company but, prior to adoption of the highway, the developer as owner is party to the agreement. Section 115 also deals with connections of surface water to a highway drainage system.
- 4. It is particularly important to have an agreement in place which confirms the area of highway being drained to the public sewer, especially where there are issues regarding capacity, connection to a combined sewer or where only highway drainage is to be connected to the public sewer.

Land Drainage – please refer to Sewer Sector Guidance (Design and Construction Guidance) and in particular section A9 (an extract of which is below).

A9 LAND DRAINAGE

1. Sewerage companies have no duty to accept land drainage runoff, flows from natural watercourses or groundwater to the public sewer system, and this is not normally permitted.



Having reviewed the current information as to proposed surface water disposal for this development, please note that method proposed to discharge into a surface water body is acceptable and meets with the Run-off Destination Hierarchy. However, should this method be amended, South West Water will require clear evidence to demonstrate why the preferred methods listed within the Run-off Destination Hierarchy have been discounted by the applicant.


Please find enclosed a plan showing the approximate location of a public 450mm combined sewer in the vicinity. Please note that no development will be permitted within 3.5 metres of the sewer, and ground cover should not be substantially altered. Where possible, the sewer must also be located within a public open space.


Should the development encroach on the 3.5 metre easement, the sewer will need to be diverted at the expense of the applicant. The ground cover of the sewer should not be substantially altered and, where possible, must also be located within a public open space.

The precise position of water mains and sewers must be ascertained by hand digging trial holes after first contacting South West Water, who will give such information as is available regarding the general location of the mains and sewer in the area. No liability is accepted for the accuracy of any information given as to the position or existence of water mains and sewers. In particular, service pipes and drainage connection are not generally shown on mains records, but their presence should be anticipated, and precautions taken to avoid damage. We recommend that before you proceed with any proposal that you precisely identify the location of the water mains and sewers and not rely on our drawings as an accurate position of them.
