

INTRODUCTION

This Condition Survey was commissioned by Slimbridge PCC to begin the process of addressing the condition of twenty two Grade II* and Grade II monuments in the churchyard of St. John the Evangelist Church.

Each monument or structure was photographed and measured and, as a written description of location can be confusing, each was located using the what3words system https://what3words.com which pinpoints the monument to within a 3 metre square.

The main structural and surface problems were identified and previous interventions helpful or otherwise were identified. Proposals have been listed which will ensure the best course of action to preserve each monument.

The listed proposals for the conservation of each monument have been priced separately and would need reviewing after 6 months.

General Description Limestone chest tomb with the main inscription panel to the south and richly carved lyre ends: on west end 3 putti heads with vase and on the east lyre end a unusual design of a collection of skulls at different angles arranged inside a carved Celtic serpent biting its own tail. Traces of lime wash in the eye socket of one skull.

Previous

Untidy cement pointing repairs under the top, especially on the south side, suspect iron cramps interventions: have been removed.

Location 5m SE of south porch door

Assessment

John Phillimore was a wealthy yeoman farmer in the area in the early 18th C. The Phillimore of significance family were important clothiers locally and many of the family had lived in Cam since 16thC.

Condition of structure

Slight lean to south, evidence of rusting iron cramp damage on all four top corners which has been badly 'repaired' with random stones and neat cement.

Condition of surface

Ivy growth on north east corner, contour scaling and surface erosion.

Cause of deterioration Rusting iron cramps which previously held the four sides together at the top.

Proposals

Apply biocide to kill the ivy growth and then gradually peel the dead stems away as the plant loses its hold.

Lift top

Remove any remaining iron cramps, dismantle sides and two lyre ends, dismantle and remove

Resest monument on a Limecrete foundation.

Reassemble monument replacing all iron cramps with stainless steel set in lead.

Rebuild and repoint with lime mortar, picking out any remaining cement pointing. Lime grout and

fill the still-attached contour scaling.

Mortar repair top scrolls of west lyre end, retaining scroll fragments.

Fill fine cracks with lime grout.

Effects of any proposed changes

Once the monument has been repaired as above, the monument will be in the best possible condition to resist the effects of the weather and it is vital to keep any invasive plant growth away from the structure.

Future requirements / maintenance

Keep plant growth cut back, monitor the monument for any cracked or open joints.

Limestone pedestal tomb, recessed panels north and south with now almost illegible inscriptions. Raised panels to east and west with swags and palm fronds and a delicately carved frieze with quatrefoils.

Assessment of significance

Condition of structure

Leaning slightly to the south east, dislocated by ivy growth which has been removed. Rusting iron cramps have lifted the top, spalling on south west corner probably caused by ivy growth. Vertical and diagonal cracking on south side of east end. Cracks in north panel, west side.

Condition of surface

Surface erosion, contour scaling on west panel and lichen growth.

Cause of deterioration

Rusting iron cramps, ivy growth and subsidence distorting and opening the joints.

Proposals

Lift top.

Dismantle monument and re-level the base.

Rebuild, pin loose fragments back at top of south side and pin across north panel.

Remove remains of rusting iron cramps and replace with stainless steel set in lead.

Replace top and repoint all with lime mortar.

Effects of any proposed changes

Stabilisation of the structure and replacing the cramps with stainless steel will prevent further damage.

Future requirements / maintenance

Inspect every 5 years to check for any open or cracked joints or plant ingress.

General Description

Dimensions

This limestone chest tomb displays some very lively and interesting late 17thC carved decoration. There are two main cartouche inscription panels on the north and south sides and both lyre ends are boldly decorated with scrolls, flowers, leaves and on the west end, three putti heads. The top is a single heavy slab of shelly limestone with a cyma recta edge and the whole rests on a single slab of limestone now partially engulfed in the surrounding grass.

Previous

None noted.

interventions:

Location 2m south of south tower wall

Assessment

An interesting and significant monument both in terms of its design, which shows both Baroque of significance and Rococo influences, and also in terms of Wade's local connections.

Condition of structure

The whole monument has a very slight lean to the south but the top has been displaced to the west with the overhang being 200mm on the west with only 90mm overhanging the east lyre end. The main structural defect is that the east lyre end has split vertically down the middle. The corner cramps are rusted and broken which has resulted in the north east half of the lyre end being completely loose and liable to fall. The west lyre end has twisted, possibly when the top was pushed to the east. The south inscription panel has its top left corner broken, probably by the expansion of a rusting iron cramp in that top corner

Condition of surface

Sulphation on lyre ends.

Cause of deterioration Rusting iron cramps, dislodged top, split lyre end.

Proposals

Lift top

Carefully remove the east lyre end and using stainless steel dowels pin the two halves back together.

Pin the top corner of the south panel back in place

Realign the west lyre end and using stainless steel cramps set in lead rebuild the monument

Replace top in correct alignment west-east Repoint monument using a matching lime mortar Consider removing built up sulphation by a poultice

Carefully remove the build up of grass and soil from around the plinth

Effects of any The monument would not be dangerous any more and would not need to be fenced off.

proposed changes

Check for any movement and open or cracked joints in the years ahead and make sure that the

requirements / grass and soil does not encroach on the monument plinth.

Limestone chest tomb with balustered corners and raised and fielded panels north and south. Cavetto plinth on Forest of Dean sandstone base. Rococo cartouche and two baluster die stones east and west. Cavetto fillet moulding around top.

Early indent repairs on south and also east and west panels.

Assessment

The Will of Nathaniel Pinnell, Gentleman of Slimbridge, Gloucestershire is lodged in the of significance National Archives ref: PROB 11/1498/80, item number 5644439 and a copy and transcript can be read in the Appendix

Condition of structure

This monument is in a dangerous condition, leaning to the north with all its rusting iron cramps failed. It could easily be pushed over and needs fencing to protect the public. Broken fragment on north panel. Plinth completely deteriorated on the south side.

Condition of surface

A fossilised branch/root, now missing from the stone of the north west corner, has been filled with lime putty. Contour scaling on east panel. Lichen growth.

Cause of deterioration Rusting iron cramps, subsidence, ivy growth jacking the panels apart, salts and frost damage.

Proposals

Lift top.

Reassemble north panel.

Pin with stainless steel set in epoxy resin and lime mortar repair.

Replace top and repoint with lime mortar.

Effects of any proposed changes

A dangerous and unsafe monument will be preserved for the future and unless action is taken soon this monument will collape.

Future requirements / maintenance

Inspect every 5 years for any movement or open and cracked joints. Keep free of any intrusive plant growth.

A limestone pedestal tomb, cavetto plinth standing on 2 large slabs. Recessed moulded panel north and south with remains of the inscriptions. Winged putti on west and palm leaf fronds on the east.

Assessment of significance More research would be needed to establish a surname to link to this monument.

Condition of structure

This tomb has been badly affected by ivy growth which has prised the tomb apart.

Condition of surface

The weathering and surface erosion is as expected for a monument of this date.

Cause of deterioration The damage has been caused by unchecked ivy growth and the decay of the rusting iron cramps which once held the sides together.

Proposals

Using a suitable biocide, reduce the vigour of the ivy and carefully peel the stems away when it loosens

Lift top and disassemble sides.

Remove rusting iron cramps and the ivy roots from inside the tomb.

Reassemble sides on the plinth using stainless steel cramps set in lead and lime mortar point the whole including the lower slabs.

Effects of any proposed

The monument would be stabilised and protected from further damage.

Future requirements / maintenance

Inspect every 5 years for any movement or open and cracked joints. Keep free of any intrusive plant growth, especially ivy.

Assessment

More research needed to establish a surname for this monument. Appears to be one of a of significance matching pair of monuments.

Condition of structure

Only the lyre ends could be assessed, the main panels are stacked underneath and their condition is unknown. One of the lyre ends is broken and top corner missing due to spalling caused by a rusting iron cramp.

Condition of surface

The surface is weathered but only as much as expected for the date.

Cause of deterioration Rusting iron cramps have probably failed completely making the structure unsafe and a decisior has been made to stack the parts ready for future reassembly.

Proposals

Lift parts for inspection for cracks and damage.

Reassemble on the original site using all available original stone using stainless steel cramps set in lead.

Repoint all with a matching lime mortar.

Effects of any proposed changes

Stacking the pieces without putting some packing between could damage the stone and damage any carved elements. It would be better to carefully lift the pile, inspect and then repact using a layer of carpet between the pieces. The monument would survive better if rebuilt.

Future requirements / maintenance

When reassembled, the monument would need to be inspected every 5 years for encroachmen of plants and any open and cracked joints.

Remove ivy from the holly tree close by and prevent it from growing too close to the tomb.

Assessment

More research needed to establish a surname for this monument. Appears to be one of a of significance matching pair of monuments.

Condition of structure

lvy is growing through many of the joints and is lifting the top, possibly in conjunction with rusting iron cramps.

Condition of surface

Reasonable condition for the age of the monument, no scaling or flaking but the growth of both lichen and ivy is a problem.

Cause of deterioration Ivy and lichen growth and rusting iron cramps.

Proposals

Lift the top.

Dismantle lyre ends.

Remove as much ivy from the inside as possible and use a biocide the kill the roots.

Reassemble all with stainless steel cramps set in lead and lime mortar point the whole including the lower slabs.

Effects of any proposed changes

Stabilisation, protection from damage caused by ivy growth and light and excluded from interior which will deter further plant encroachment.

Future requirements / maintenance

Remove ivy from the holly tree close by and prevent it from growing too close to the tomb. Inspect every 5 years for any movement or open and cracked joints. Keep free of any intrusive plant growth.

Dimensions

Forest of Dean sandstone pedestal tomb with recessed panels north and south containing inscriptions. Shield shaped raised panels to east and west also inscribed. Chamfered plinth and moulded top with evidence that the whole monument was limewashed.

Previous interventions:

None noted

Assessment

The Phillimore family were important clothiers locally and many of the family had lived in Cam since 16thC. Daniel Phillimore was born in Slimbridge about 1751 and was the son of John Phillimore, (see record 10908990.) Daniel Phillimore married Ann Tainton and had two children, George and Mary. He died 28th April 1837.

Condition of structure

Iron cramp damaghe to SW corner and top dislocated to NW exposing a rusting iron cramp. Some open joints.

Condition of surface

The top surface of the monument is very nicely tooled and has weathered slightly. There are small patches of delamination on all sides. There are traces of limewash and it is possible that the whole may have been black originally.

Cause of deterioration

Rusting iron cramps have caused damage as has unchecked ivy growth.

Proposals

Remove ivy.

Lift top.

Remove rusting iron cramps. Replace with Stainless steel set in lead.

Replace top.

Repoint all open or cracked joints with matching lime mortar and fill delaminating areas with matching lime mortar to avoid water traps.

Effects of any proposed changes

The risk of further damage caused by rusting iron cramps would be removed and the monumen would be weather proof. Damage caused by plant growth would be avoided.

Future requirements / maintenance

Inspect every 5 years for any movement or open and cracked joints. Keep free of any intrusive plant growth.

Additional notes

Ann Phillimore is also recorded on the north panel of this monument. Also Margaret and also the infant daughter of Daniel, Jane Elizabeth Phillimore, who died aged 1 year..

General Description

Dimensions

Red Forest of Dean sandstone pedestal tomb with a cyma recta plinth set on two courses of sandstone slabs. The main panels are to the north and south and have elliptical cartouches with drapery. The west and east sides have raised elliptical cartouches with a geometric freize above. The top is of grey Forest of Dean sandstone.

Previous

interventions: None identified

Location 2.5 m north of vestry

Assessment

Daniel Long is commemorated on the north panel, he died 1824. Further research would be of significance need to establish the importance of this family in Slimbridge.

Condition of structure

Dislocated slab on south side on upper course of the base.

Condition of surface

Delamination in small localised areas, strong licheb growth on the north side of the monument. There are traces of limewash.

Cause of deterioration There is a build up of the ground level on the north side and the dislodged slab of the base has a bramble growing out of it. There is also a quantity of moss growing on the monument.

Proposals

Clear the adjacent plant growth and remove the moss from the base and plinth.

Clear the soil build up on the south side.

Relocate the slab in the base.

Grout and mortar fill areas of delamination.

Effects of any proposed changes

The proposed works will weatherproof the monument and removing the moss will allow the stone to dry naturally.

Future requirements / maintenance

It would need to be inspected for encroachment of soil or plants and checked for any open or cracked joints. Schedule to inspect every 5 years ideally.

General Description

Grey Forest of Dean sandstone chest tomb with a cavetto plinth, inscription panels north and south with a book and palm frond on the west and a large skull and cross bones on the east on which there are traces of limewash. Red Forest of Dean architrave above the panels east and west.

Previous Very pointerventions: growth.

Very poor sand and cement pointing at the west end, presumably to fill the gap caused by ivy growth.

Location 6m inside the gate west side, near the boundary wall

Assessment of significance

George Watts was born at Oldbury on the Hill on 15th June 1697 to Nathaniel Watts and Edith Roach. George Watts married Anne Stephens and had three children, Nathaniel, Elizabeth and Ann. George Watts died in 1783 in Didmarton. More research would be needed to establish the family connection with Slimbridge.

Condition of structure

The joints are fairly tight and apart from a crack in the architrave at the east end the monument is in quite good structural condition.

Condition of surface

Delamination of the surface on the north, south and west with a small area on the east end.

Cause of deterioration

Excessive ivy growth in the past and salts accumulated in the surface.

Proposals

Remove the remains of the ivy and the adjacent large stump.

Carefully remove cement pointing and repoint with lime mortar.

Grout the delaminations and fill any areas necessary with a mortar fillet.

Due to its position at the corner of the churchyard the area behind the monument is used as a compost heap for dead flowers etc. If the area was kept more open and free of vegetation then this is less likely to happen.

Effects of any proposed changes

The monument would be weatherproof and less likely to be encroached by ivy and other vegetation.

Future requirements / maintenance

the monument would need to be inspected for encroachment of plants and any open and cracked joints. Schedule to inspect every 5 years.

Limestone chest tomb on a sandstone slab base. Cavetto plinth, raised rectangular inscription panels to north and south. Rococo cartouche ends and quarter balusters on the corners. moulded top.

Assessment

Further research would be needed to establish the correct name associated with this monument of significance Humphrey Wind's (?) was a cabinet maker by profession as it says on the inscription panel and was clearly wealthy enough to commission an elaborate monument for himself and his family.

Condition of structure

The monument is leaning to the south and rusting iron cramps are lifting the top and damaging the sides on the south, east and west. There is also evidence of the base subsiding.

NB The structure is unsafe and could collapse.

Condition of surface

There is extensive delamination to all sides. Lichen growth is also a problem. There are traces c old limewash on the east and west ends.

Cause of deterioration Subsidence and rusting iron cramps are the main causes of deterioration.

Lift top, dismantle sides. **Proposals**

Level base.

Rebuild all with lime mortar.

Pin across cracks and mortar repair damaged stone at corners

Reassemble with new stainless steel cramps set in lead.

Replace top.

Effects of any

The structure would be safe again.

Inspect every 5 years for any movement or open and cracked joints. Keep free of any intrusive plant growth. requirements /



Dimensions

Twenty nine panels (76m) of mid 19thC cast iron railings set into limestone coping above a limestone squared rubble wall. The slender bars, 27 per section, are terminated with spear shaped rail heads and the main supporting posts with decorative gold painted finials.

Patches of cement pointing in places.

Assessment As so many irror of significance the local area.

As so many iron railings were taken away during WWII any that survived intact are significant to the local area.

The railings are mostly in a rusty condition with a few bent and others missing with some missing their rail heads. The large majority are intact however and the wall supporting them needs some stone replacement in parts but is otherwise in a reasonable structural condition.

Condition of surface

The paint is peeling away from the rails and rust is showing through and the rail head also need repainting.

The surface of the wall below has some plant growth in the joints.

Cause of deterioration

The railings have not been painted recently and the iron is beginning to rust, the wall has been pointed with cement in places which traps the water in the stone.

Proposals

All the railings should be rubbed down and new matching rail heads sourced to replace the few missing.

The bent rails could be straightened.

Repaint all after applying a rust preventative primer/undercoat. Repaint the rail heads.

Repoint all open and cracked joints in the retaining wall and in the coping using lime mortar.

Effects of any proposed changes

The work would extend the life of the railings and would also improve the appearance.

Future requirements / maintenance

Repaint the railings and repoint the wall as necessary but check at least every 5 years for vandalism or decay.





A pair of heavy wrought iron gates with fleur-de-lys rail heads supported by limestone ashlar piers the right pier (from outside) partly built into the wall, with an overthrow supporting a large bronze lantern with acroteria decoration at the four corners.

The gates are rusting where the paint has peeled away, the condition of the limestone piers is reasonable for the age though there are open and cracked joints.

Cause of deterioration Rusting iron and possible impact by a vehicle.

Proposals

Remove the moulded cap of the left pier and dismantle the top two courses. The overthrow would need to be supported while this work took place.

Clean out and remove the pintles from both gate piers and re-tip with stainless steel.

Gates: remove, strip and rub down the cast iron, prepare and repaint all.

Refix the gates ensuring that they close correctly.

Effects of any proposed changes

The gates would work perfectly as the distorted pier would be aligned correctly.

Future maintenance

Check for any open or cracked joints at least every 5 years as the constant opening and closing requirements / of the gates will cause wear and tear.


CONCLUSION

The general surface condition of the limestone monuments is reasonably good considering their age and maintenance over the years. The Forest of Dean monuments are suffering from delamination in some cases but this is very common in sedimentary sandstones which are face bedded.

By far the major issue and the majority of structural problems have been caused by rusting iron cramps. These have caused cracking as the rust expands in the stone and has led to instability and collapse in some cases. A few of the monuments have been subject to ground movement and subsidence and some have been allowed to be engulfed with vegetation which has prised the joints of the monument apart.

Apart from the repairs outlined above, regular maintenance will be the key to ensuring that these structures of national interest are preserved to be safely enjoyed and studied by future generations.
