About Ross-on-Wye Town Council

Ross-on-Wye Town Council is a parish council serving the people of Ross-on-Wye and is passionate about ensuring the town is a vibrant place for residents, businesses and visitors.

Ross-on-Wye Town Council was established in 1974 following the introduction of the Local Government Act 1972. It underwent further changes in 2015 after a boundary review resulted in its amalgamation with Ross Rural Parish Council. It is comprised of eighteen councillors representing the town's three wards: North, East and West. The councillors have been elected by the residents to represent their interests on matters which affect the town. To achieve this, councillors strive to improve services and amenities for both the residents and visitors. Town Councillors are supported by officers based at the Town Hall, Cantilupe Road, Ross-on-Wye.

Project Details

The historic Market House in Ross-on-Wye is undergoing a programme of repair and restoration works and part of this includes developing legacy projects. We have been awarded funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, The Wolfson Foundation and The Pilgrim Trust, with the remainder of the project costs being funded by Ross-on-Wye Town Council.

The Market House is a cherished iconic landmark, deeply connected to how local people view and regard Ross-on-Wye. As the town's focal point, it is widely used as a meeting point and is closely associated with many annual events and celebrations that bring our community together, from pancake races to the switching on of Christmas lights. For the one secondary and three primary schools in Ross, its value lies in its tangible connection to the past: exploring this Scheduled Ancient Monument creates a memorable learning experience. It has featured in many school projects from historical studies to art exhibitions. Teachers who have used the Market House to support their lessons confirm its educational value and feel strongly about its upkeep.

To demonstrate the depth of feeling within our community we ran a "what three words" exercise to reveal people's strongest associations with the Market House. The top recurring words confirmed that people regard the building as part of the town's heritage and history; view it as the heart of the town, an important landmark and local feature; and recognise its distinct aesthetic value. Conversely a number of responses included "restoration/needs saving/needs work" revealing interest in, and concern with the need to secure, the future of this much-loved building. Similarly, our Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) confirms concerns about the decline of the Conservation Area and the Market House being at risk. Our project reflects this and will support a number of the Plan's key objectives.

In addition to this the project aims to achieve several other objectives:

- Heritage will be in a better condition
- Heritage will be identified and better explained
- People will have learned about heritage, leading to change in ideas and actions
- The local area will be a better place to live, work or visit
- The local economy will be boosted

As a result of the project, the Market House will remain open to the public, free of charge, between the hours of 10am and 4pm, 7 days a week throughout the year, providing access for visitors wishing to explore and learn more about the building and its heritage. During these opening hours visitors will be able to access the information panels explaining the history of the building and the town, the hedgehog hub, and to engage with the work of local artists and craftspeople.

Interpretation Boards

Ross-on-Wye Town Council is inviting proposals from suitably qualified individuals or organisations to undertake the design and manufacture of interior and exterior interpretation boards for The Market House, Ross-on-Wye. All boards will need to include acknowledgement of the funders involved.



The aim of the Interpretation Boards is to enable the heritage of the building and the Town to be identified and explained and these will be expected to include four discovery routes which connect the past with life in Ross today:

1. Market pathway, centred on the Market House, telling the story of Ross as a market town from its origins in the 12th century to market trading today
2. Tourism pathway, telling the story of Ross as the birthplace of British tourism from the first organised tour in the 18th century to the present day
3. Hedgehog pathway, telling the story of the town's historic emblem and connecting to the plight of the hedgehog in the 21st century
4. Civil War / Monarchy pathway, telling the story of this Royalist stronghold during the Civil War

We are open to creative and innovative ways of achieving this and welcome your suggestions. Suggested content for the interpretation boards will be provided.

We would like you to specify the methodology you plan to use to meet the aims and objectives of the work. The Town Council would favour materials that are local/ethically sourced/recycled but that are durable and fade resistant. An explanation of why the proposed material have been chosen should be provided.
