

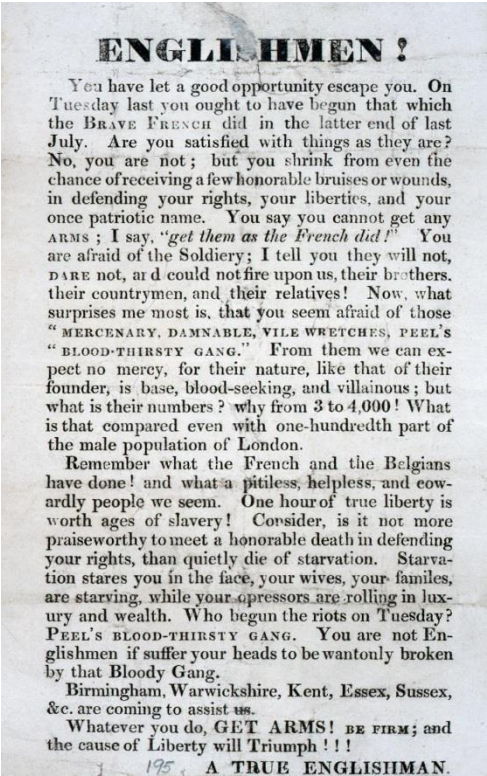

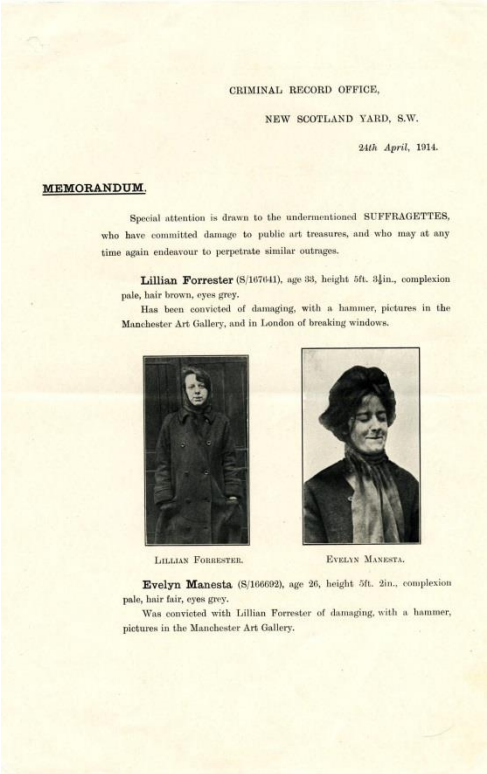
Second World War propaganda – a matchbook from America showing Hitler’s face encircled by a snake.



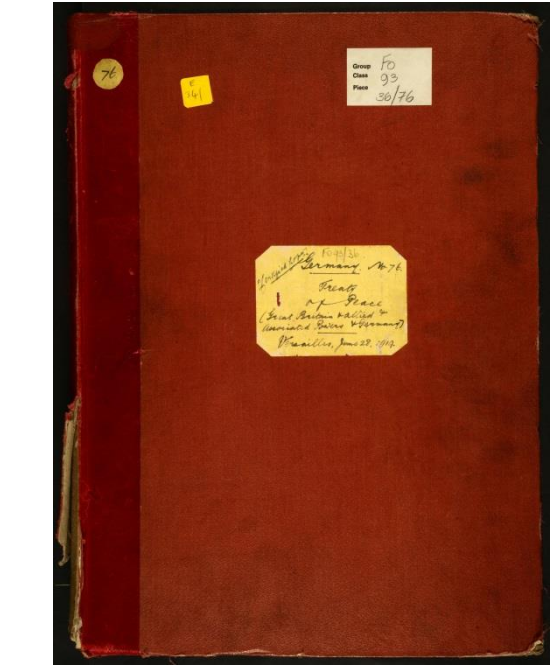
Illustration of Radical Reformers in the protest known as the Peterloo Massacre in St. Peter’s Place, Manchester in 1819.



Handbill from 1830 encouraging men to rise up against the Police.



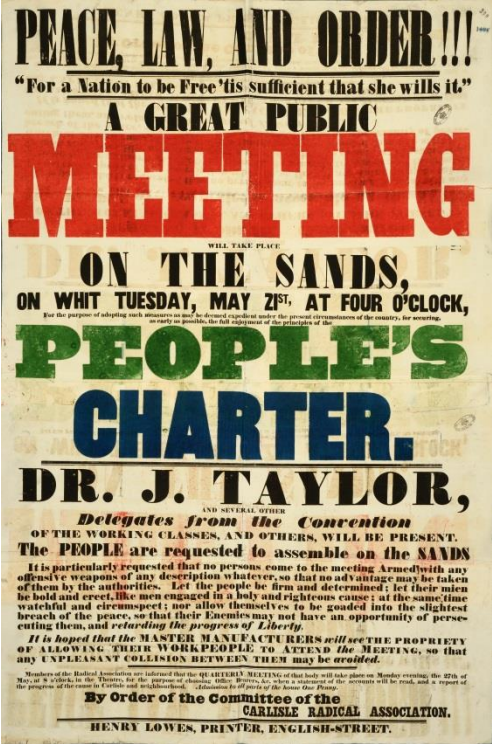
Scotland Yard memorandum about Suffragettes Evelyn Manesta and Lillian Forrester, and photograph of Manesta restrained, before the arm was painted out.
