Joint Schedule 3 (Insurance Requirements)

1. The insurance you need to have

The Supplier shall take out and maintain, or procure the taking out and maintenance of the insurances as set out in the Annex to this Schedule, any additional insurances required under a Call-Off Contract (specified in the applicable Order Form) ("Additional Insurances") and any other insurances as may be required by applicable Law (together the "Insurances"). The Supplier shall ensure that each of the Insurances is effective no later than:

to this Schedule and those required by applicable Law; and

.the Call-Off Contract Effective Date in respect of the Additional Insurances.

- . The Insurances shall be:
 - .maintained in accordance with Good Industry Practice;
 - (so far as is reasonably practicable) on terms no less favourable than those generally available to a prudent contractor in respect of risks insured in the international insurance market from time to time;
 - .taken out and maintained with insurers of good financial standing and good repute in the international insurance market; and
 - .maintained for at least six (6) years after the End Date.
- The Supplier shall ensure that the public and products liability policy contain an indemnity to principals clause under which the Relevant Authority shall be indemnified in respect of claims made against the Relevant Authority in respect of death or bodily injury or third party property damage arising out of or in connection with the Deliverables and for which the Supplier is legally liable.

10. How to manage the insurance

- . Without limiting the other provisions of this Contract, the Supplier shall:
 - .take or procure the taking of all reasonable risk management and risk control measures in relation to Deliverables as it would be reasonable to expect of a prudent contractor acting in accordance with Good Industry Practice, including the investigation and reports of relevant claims to insurers;
 - promptly notify the insurers in writing of any relevant material fact under any Insurances of which the Supplier is or becomes aware; and
 - .Hold all policies in respect of the Insurances and cause any insurance broker affecting the Insurances to hold any insurance slips and other evidence of placing cover representing any of the Insurances to which it is a party.

11. What happens if you aren't insured

- The Supplier shall not take any action or fail to take any action or (insofar as is reasonably within its power) permit anything to occur in relation to it which would entitle any insurer to refuse to pay any claim under any of the Insurances.
- Where the Supplier has failed to purchase or maintain any of the Insurances in full force and effect, the Relevant Authority may elect (but shall not be obliged) following written notice to the Supplier to purchase the relevant Insurances and recover the reasonable premium and other reasonable costs incurred in connection therewith as a debt due from the Supplier.

12. Evidence of insurance you must provide

The Supplier shall upon the Start Date and within 15 Working Days after the renewal of each of the Insurances, provide evidence, in a form satisfactory to the Relevant Authority, that the Insurances are in force and effect and meet in full the requirements of this Schedule.

13. Making sure you are insured to the required amount

The Supplier shall ensure that any Insurances which are stated to have a minimum limit "in the aggregate" are maintained at all times for the minimum limit of indemnity specified in this Contract and if any claims are made which do not relate to this Contract then the Supplier shall notify the Relevant Authority and provide details of its proposed solution for maintaining the minimum limit of indemnity.

14. Cancelled Insurance

- The Supplier shall notify the Relevant Authority in writing at least five (5) Working Days prior to the cancellation, suspension, termination or non-renewal of any of the Insurances.
- The Supplier shall ensure that nothing is done which would entitle the relevant insurer to cancel, rescind or suspend any insurance or cover, or to treat any insurance, cover or claim as voided in whole or part. The Supplier shall use all reasonable endeavours to notify the Relevant Authority (subject to third party confidentiality obligations) as soon as practicable when it becomes aware of any relevant fact, circumstance or matter which has caused, or is reasonably likely to provide grounds to, the relevant insurer to give notice to cancel, rescind, suspend or void any insurance, or any cover or claim under any insurance in whole or in part.

15. Insurance claims

The Supplier shall promptly notify to insurers any matter arising from, or in relation to, the Deliverables, or each Contract for which it may be entitled to claim under any of the Insurances. In the event that the Relevant Authority receives a claim relating to or arising out of a Contract or the Deliverables, the Supplier shall cooperate with the Relevant Authority and assist it in dealing with such claims including without

limitation providing information and documentation in a timely manner.

- Except where the Relevant Authority is the claimant party, the Supplier shall give the Relevant Authority notice within twenty (20) Working Days after any insurance claim in excess of 10% of the sum required to be insured pursuant to Paragraph 5.1 relating to or arising out of the provision of the Deliverables or this Contract on any of the Insurances or which, but for the application of the applicable policy excess, would be made on any of the Insurances and (if required by the Relevant Authority) full details of the incident giving rise to the claim.
- . Where any Insurance requires payment of a premium, the Supplier shall be liable for and shall promptly pay such premium.
- Where any Insurance is subject to an excess or deductible below which the indemnity from insurers is excluded, the Supplier shall be liable for such excess or deductible. The Supplier shall not be entitled to recover from the Relevant Authority any sum paid by way of excess or deductible under the Insurances whether under the terms of this Contract or otherwise.

- . Where a Party is a Processor, the only Processing that it is authorised to do is listed in Annex 1 (*Processing Personal Data*) by the Controller.
- . The Processor shall notify the Controller immediately if it considers that any of the Controller's instructions infringe the Data Protection Legislation.
- The Processor shall provide all reasonable assistance to the Controller in the preparation of any Data Protection Impact Assessment prior to commencing any Processing. Such assistance may, at the discretion of the Controller, include:
- . a systematic description of the envisaged Processing and the purpose of the Processing;
- . an assessment of the necessity and proportionality of the Processing in relation to the

Deliverables:

- . an assessment of the risks to the rights and freedoms of Data Subjects; and
- the measures envisaged to address the risks, including safeguards, security measures and mechanisms to ensure the protection of Personal Data.
- The Processor shall, in relation to any Personal Data Processed in connection with its obligations under the Contract:
- Process that Personal Data only in accordance with Annex 1 (*Processing Personal Data*), unless the Processor is required to do otherwise by Law. If it is so required the Processor shall notify the Controller before Processing the Personal Data unless prohibited by Law;
- ensure that it has in place Protective Measures, including in the case of the Supplier the measures set out in Clause 14.3 of the Core Terms, which the Controller may reasonably reject (but failure to reject shall not amount to approval by the Controller of the adequacy of the Protective Measures) having taken account of the:
 - . nature of the data to be protected;
 - . harm that might result from a Personal Data Breach;
 - . state of technological development; and
 - cost of implementing any measures;

ensure that :

- the Processor Personnel do not Process Personal Data except in accordance with the Contract (and in particular Annex 1 (*Processing Personal Data*));
- it takes all reasonable steps to ensure the reliability and integrity of any Processor Personnel who have access to the Personal Data and ensure that they:
 - are aware of and comply with the Processor's duties under this Joint Schedule 11, Clauses 14 (*Data protection*), 15 (*What you must keep confidential*) and 16 (*When you can share information*) of the Core Terms:
 - . are subject to appropriate confidentiality undertakings with the Processor or any Subprocessor;
 - . are informed of the confidential nature of the Personal Data and do not publish, disclose or divulge any of the Personal Data to any third party unless directed in writing to do so by the Controller or as otherwise permitted by the Contract; and
 - have undergone adequate training in the use, care, protection and handling of Personal Data;
- . not transfer Personal Data outside of the UK or EU unless the prior written consent of

the Controller has been obtained and the following conditions are fulfilled:

- the Controller or the Processor has provided appropriate safeguards in relation to the transfer (whether in accordance with UK GDPR Article 46 or LED Article 37) as determined by the Controller;
- the Data Subject has enforceable rights and effective legal remedies;
- the Processor complies with its obligations under the Data Protection Legislation by providing an adequate level of protection to any Personal Data that is transferred (or, if it is not so bound, uses its best endeavours to assist the Controller in meeting its obligations); and
- the Processor complies with any reasonable instructions notified to it in advance by the Controller with respect to the Processing of the Personal Data; and
- . at the written direction of the Controller, delete or return Personal Data (and any copies of it) to the Controller on termination of the Contract unless the Processor is required by Law to retain the Personal Data.
- Subject to paragraph 8 of this Joint Schedule 11, the Processor shall notify the Controller immediately if in relation to it Processing Personal Data under or in connection with the Contract it:
- receives a Data Subject Access Request (or purported Data Subject Access Request);
- . receives a request to rectify, block or erase any Personal Data;
- receives any other request, complaint or communication relating to either Party's obligations under the Data Protection Legislation;
- . receives any communication from the Information Commissioner or any other regulatory authority in connection with Personal Data Processed under the Contract;
- . receives a request from any third Party for disclosure of Personal Data where compliance with such request is required or purported to be required by Law; or
- becomes aware of a Personal Data Breach.
- The Processor's obligation to notify under paragraph 7 of this Joint Schedule 11 shall include the provision of further information to the Controller, as details become available.
- Taking into account the nature of the Processing, the Processor shall provide the Controller with assistance in relation to either Party's obligations under Data Protection Legislation and any complaint, communication or request made under paragraph 7 of this Joint Schedule 11 (and insofar as possible within the timescales reasonably required by the Controller) including by immediately providing:
- . the Controller with full details and copies of the complaint, communication or request;
- such assistance as is reasonably requested by the Controller to enable it to comply

with a Data Subject Access Request within the relevant timescales set out in the Data Protection Legislation;

- the Controller, at its request, with any Personal Data it holds in relation to a Data Subject;
- . assistance as requested by the Controller following any Personal Data Breach; and/or
- . assistance as requested by the Controller with respect to any request from the Information Commissioner's Office, or any consultation by the Controller with the Information Commissioner's Office.
- The Processor shall maintain complete and accurate records and information to demonstrate its compliance with this Joint Schedule 11. This requirement does not apply where the Processor employs fewer than 250 staff, unless:
- . the Controller determines that the Processing is not occasional;
- the Controller determines the Processing includes special categories of data as referred to in Article 9(1) of the UK GDPR or Personal Data relating to criminal convictions and offences referred to in Article 10 of the UK GDPR; or
- the Controller determines that the Processing is likely to result in a risk to the rights and freedoms of Data Subjects.
- The Processor shall allow for audits of its Data Processing activity by the Controller or the Controller's designated auditor.
- The Parties shall designate a Data Protection Officer if required by the Data Protection Legislation.
- Before allowing any Subprocessor to Process any Personal Data related to the Contract, the Processor must:
- . notify the Controller in writing of the intended Subprocessor and Processing;
- . obtain the written consent of the Controller;
- enter into a written agreement with the Subprocessor which give effect to the terms set out in this Joint Schedule 11 such that they apply to the Subprocessor; and
- . provide the Controller with such information regarding the Subprocessor as the Controller may reasonably require.
- The Processor shall remain fully liable for all acts or omissions of any of its Subprocessors.
- The Relevant Authority may, at any time on not less than thirty (30) Working Days' notice, revise this Joint Schedule 11 by replacing it with any applicable controller to processor standard clauses or similar terms forming part of an applicable certification scheme (which shall apply when incorporated by attachment to the Contract).

The Parties agree to take account of any guidance issued by the Information Commissioner's Office. The Relevant Authority may on not less than thirty (30) Working Days' notice to the Supplier amend the Contract to ensure that it complies with any guidance issued by the Information Commissioner's Office.

Where the Parties are Joint Controllers of Personal Data

In the event that the Parties are Joint Controllers in respect of Personal Data under the Contract, the Parties shall implement paragraphs that are necessary to comply with UK GDPR Article 26 based on the terms set out in Annex 2 to this Joint Schedule 11.

Independent Controllers of Personal Data

- With respect to Personal Data provided by one Party to another Party for which each Party acts as Controller but which is not under the Joint Control of the Parties, each Party undertakes to comply with the applicable Data Protection Legislation in respect of their Processing of such Personal Data as Controller.
- Each Party shall Process the Personal Data in compliance with its obligations under the Data Protection Legislation and not do anything to cause the other Party to be in breach of it.
- . Where a Party has provided Personal Data to the other Party in accordance with paragraph 18 of this Joint Schedule 11 above, the recipient of the Personal Data will provide all such relevant documents and information relating to its data protection policies and procedures as the other Party may reasonably require.
- The Parties shall be responsible for their own compliance with Articles 13 and 14 UK GDPR in respect of the Processing of Personal Data for the purposes of the Contract.
- . The Parties shall only provide Personal Data to each other:
- to the extent necessary to perform their respective obligations under the Contract;
- in compliance with the Data Protection Legislation (including by ensuring all required data privacy information has been given to affected Data Subjects to meet the requirements of Articles 13 and 14 of the UK GDPR); and
- . where it has recorded it in Annex 1 (*Processing Personal Data*).
- Taking into account the state of the art, the costs of implementation and the nature, scope, context and purposes of Processing as well as the risk of varying likelihood and severity for the rights and freedoms of natural persons, each Party shall, with respect to its Processing of Personal Data as Independent Controller, implement and maintain appropriate technical and organisational measures to ensure a level of security appropriate to that risk, including, as appropriate, the measures referred to in Article 32(1)(a), (b), (c) and (d) of the UK GDPR, and the measures shall, at a minimum, comply

with the requirements of the Data Protection Legislation, including Article 32 of the UK GDPR.

- A Party Processing Personal Data for the purposes of the Contract shall maintain a record of its Processing activities in accordance with Article 30 UK GDPR and shall make the record available to the other Party upon reasonable request.
- Where a Party receives a request by any Data Subject to exercise any of their rights under the Data Protection Legislation in relation to the Personal Data provided to it by the other Party pursuant to the Contract ("Request Recipient"):
- the other Party shall provide any information and/or assistance as reasonably requested by the Request Recipient to help it respond to the request or correspondence, at the cost of the Request Recipient; or
- where the request or correspondence is directed to the other Party and/or relates to that other Party's Processing of the Personal Data, the Request Recipient will:
 - . promptly, and in any event within five (5) Working Days of receipt of the request or correspondence, inform the other Party that it has received the same and shall forward such request or correspondence to the other Party; and
 - provide any information and/or assistance as reasonably requested by the other Party to help it respond to the request or correspondence in the timeframes specified by Data Protection Legislation.
- Each Party shall promptly notify the other Party upon it becoming aware of any Personal Data Breach relating to Personal Data provided by the other Party pursuant to the Contract and shall:
- do all such things as reasonably necessary to assist the other Party in mitigating the effects of the Personal Data Breach;
- implement any measures necessary to restore the security of any compromised Personal Data;
- work with the other Party to make any required notifications to the Information Commissioner's Office and affected Data Subjects in accordance with the Data Protection Legislation (including the timeframes set out therein); and
- not do anything which may damage the reputation of the other Party or that Party's relationship with the relevant Data Subjects, save as required by Law.
- Personal Data provided by one Party to the other Party may be used exclusively to exercise rights and obligations under the Contract as specified in Annex 1 (*Processing*

Personal Data).

- Personal Data shall not be retained or processed for longer than is necessary to perform each Party's respective obligations under the Contract which is specified in Annex 1 (Processing Personal Data).
- Notwithstanding the general application of paragraphs 2 to 16 of this Joint Schedule 11 to Personal Data, where the Supplier is required to exercise its regulatory and/or legal obligations in respect of Personal Data, it shall act as an Independent Controller of Personal Data in accordance with paragraphs 18 to 28 of this Joint Schedule 11.



- 1.1 The Order Form lists the key roles ("**Key Roles**") and names of the persons who the Supplier shall appoint to fill those Key Roles at the Start Date.
- 1.2 The Supplier shall ensure that the Key Staff fulfil the Key Roles at all times during the Contract Period.
- 1.3 The Buyer may identify any further roles as being Key Roles and, following agreement to the same by the Supplier, the relevant person selected to fill those Key Roles shall be included on the list of Key Staff.
- 1.4 The Supplier shall not and shall procure that any Subcontractor shall not remove or replace any Key Staff unless:
 - 1.4.1 requested to do so by the Buyer or the Buyer Approves such removal or replacement (not to be unreasonably withheld or delayed);
 - 1.4.2 the person concerned resigns, retires or dies or is on maternity or long-term sick leave: or
 - 1.4.3 the person's employment or contractual arrangement with the Supplier or Subcontractor is terminated for material breach of contract by the employee.

1.5 The Supplier shall:

- 1.5.1 notify the Buyer promptly of the absence of any Key Staff (other than for shortterm sickness or holidays of two (2) weeks or less, in which case the Supplier shall ensure appropriate temporary cover for that Key Role);
- 1.5.2 ensure that any Key Role is not vacant for any longer than ten (10) Working Days;
- 1.5.3 give as much notice as is reasonably practicable of its intention to remove or replace any member of Key Staff and, except in the cases of death, unexpected ill health or a material breach of the Key Staff's employment contract, this will mean at least three (3) Months' notice;
- 1.5.4 ensure that all arrangements for planned changes in Key Staff provide adequate periods during which incoming and outgoing staff work together to transfer responsibilities and ensure that such change does not have an adverse impact on the provision of the Deliverables; and

- 1.5.5 ensure that any replacement for a Key Role has a level of qualifications and experience appropriate to the relevant Key Role and is fully competent to carry out the tasks assigned to the Key Staff whom he or she has replaced.
- 1.6 The Buyer may require the Supplier to remove or procure that any Subcontractor shall remove any Key Staff that the Buyer considers in any respect unsatisfactory. The Buyer shall not be liable for the cost of replacing any Key Staff.

Call-Off Schedule 9 (Security)

Part A: Short Form Security Requirements

1. Definitions

In this Schedule, the following words shall have the following meanings and they shall supplement Joint Schedule 1 (Definitions):

"Breach of	the occurrence of:
Security"	any unauthorised access to or use of the Deliverables, the Sites and/or any Information and Communication Technology ("ICT"), information or data (including the Confidential Information and the Government Data) used by the Buyer and/or the Supplier in connection with this Contract; and/or
	the loss and/or unauthorised disclosure of any information or data (including the Confidential Information and the Government Data), including any copies of such information or data, used by the Buyer and/or the Supplier in connection with this Contract,
	in either case as more particularly set out in the Security Policy where the Buyer has required compliance therewith in accordance with paragraph 2.2;
"Security Management Plan"	the Supplier's security management plan prepared pursuant to this Schedule, a draft of which has been provided by the Supplier to the Buyer and has been updated from time to time.

20. Complying with security requirements and updates to them

. The Buyer and the Supplier recognise that, where specified in Framework Schedule 4

(Framework Management), CCS shall have the right to enforce the Buyer's rights under this Schedule.

- The Supplier shall comply with the requirements in this Schedule in respect of the Security Management Plan. Where specified by a Buyer that has undertaken a Further Competition it shall also comply with the Security Policy and shall ensure that the Security Management Plan produced by the Supplier fully complies with the Security Policy.
- . Where the Security Policy applies the Buyer shall notify the Supplier of any changes or proposed changes to the Security Policy.
- If the Supplier believes that a change or proposed change to the Security Policy will have a material and unavoidable cost implication to the provision of the Deliverables, it may propose a Variation to the Buyer. In doing so, the Supplier must support its request by providing evidence of the cause of any increased costs and the steps that it has taken to mitigate those costs. Any change to the Charges shall be subject to the Variation Procedure.
- . Until and/or unless a change to the Charges is agreed by the Buyer pursuant to the Variation Procedure the Supplier shall continue to provide the Deliverables in accordance with its existing obligations.

21. Security Standards

- . The Supplier acknowledges that the Buyer places great emphasis on the reliability of the performance of the Deliverables, confidentiality, integrity and availability of information and consequently on security.
- The Supplier shall be responsible for the effective performance of its security obligations and shall at all times provide a level of security which:
 - . is in accordance with the Law and this Contract;
 - . as a minimum demonstrates Good Industry Practice;
 - . meets any specific security threats of immediate relevance to the Deliverables and/or the Government Data; and
 - where specified by the Buyer in accordance with paragraph 2.2 complies with the Security Policy and the ICT Policy.
- The references to standards, guidance and policies contained or set out in Paragraph 3.2 shall be deemed to be references to such items as developed and updated and to any successor to or replacement for such standards, guidance and policies, as notified to the Supplier from time to time.
- In the event of any inconsistency in the provisions of the above standards, guidance and policies, the Supplier should notify the Buyer's Representative of such inconsistency immediately upon becoming aware of the same, and the Buyer's Representative shall, as soon as practicable, advise the Supplier which provision the Supplier shall be required to comply with.

22. Security Management Plan

Introduction

The Supplier shall develop and maintain a Security Management Plan in accordance with this Schedule. The Supplier shall thereafter comply with its obligations set out in the Security Management Plan.

Content of the Security Management Plan

. The Security Management Plan shall:

- . comply with the principles of security set out in Paragraph 3 and any other provisions of this Contract relevant to security;
- identify the necessary delegated organisational roles for those responsible for ensuring it is complied with by the Supplier;
- detail the process for managing any security risks from Subcontractors and third parties authorised by the Buyer with access to the Deliverables, processes associated with the provision of the Deliverables, the Buyer Premises, the Sites and any ICT, Information and data (including the Buyer's Confidential Information and the Government Data) and any system that could directly or indirectly have an impact on that Information, data and/or the Deliverables;
- be developed to protect all aspects of the Deliverables and all processes associated with the provision of the Deliverables, including the Buyer Premises, the Sites, and any ICT, Information and data (including the Buyer's Confidential Information and the Government Data) to the extent used by the Buyer or the Supplier in connection with this Contract or in connection with any system that could directly or indirectly have an impact on that Information, data and/or the Deliverables;
- set out the security measures to be implemented and maintained by the Supplier in relation to all aspects of the Deliverables and all processes associated with the provision of the Goods and/or Services and shall at all times comply with and specify security measures and procedures which are sufficient to ensure that the Deliverables comply with the provisions of this Contract;
- set out the plans for transitioning all security arrangements and responsibilities for the Supplier to meet the full obligations of the security requirements set out in this Contract and, where necessary in accordance with paragraph 2.2 the Security Policy; and
- be written in plain English in language which is readily comprehensible to the staff of the Supplier and the Buyer engaged in the provision of the Deliverables and shall only reference documents which are in the possession of the Parties or whose location is otherwise specified in this Schedule.

Development of the Security Management Plan

- Within twenty (20) Working Days after the Start Date and in accordance with Paragraph 4.4, the Supplier shall prepare and deliver to the Buyer for Approval a fully complete and up to date Security Management Plan which will be based on the draft Security Management Plan.
- If the Security Management Plan submitted to the Buyer in accordance with Paragraph 4.3.1, or any subsequent revision to it in accordance with Paragraph 4.4, is Approved it will be adopted immediately and will replace the previous version of the Security Management Plan and thereafter operated and maintained in accordance with this Schedule. If the Security Management Plan is not Approved, the Supplier shall amend it within ten (10) Working Days of a notice of non-approval from the Buyer and re-submit to the Buyer for Approval. The Parties will use all reasonable endeavours to ensure that the approval process takes as little time as possible and in any event no longer than fifteen (15) Working Days from the date of its first submission to the Buyer. If the Buyer does not approve the Security Management Plan following its resubmission, the matter will be resolved in accordance with the Dispute Resolution Procedure.
- The Buyer shall not unreasonably withhold or delay its decision to Approve or not the Security Management Plan pursuant to Paragraph 4.3.2. However, a refusal by the Buyer to Approve the Security Management Plan on the grounds that it does not comply with the requirements set out in Paragraph 4.2 shall be deemed to be reasonable.
- Approval by the Buyer of the Security Management Plan pursuant to Paragraph 4.3.2 or of any change to the Security Management Plan in accordance with Paragraph 4.4 shall not relieve the Supplier of its obligations under this Schedule.

Amendment of the Security Management Plan

- The Security Management Plan shall be fully reviewed and updated by the Supplier at least annually to reflect:
 - . emerging changes in Good Industry Practice;
 - . any change or proposed change to the Deliverables and/or associated processes;
 - where necessary in accordance with paragraph 2.2, any change to the Security Policy;
 - . any new perceived or changed security threats; and
 - . any reasonable change in requirements requested by the Buyer.
- The Supplier shall provide the Buyer with the results of such reviews as soon as reasonably practicable after their completion and amendment of the Security Management Plan at no additional cost to the Buyer. The results of the review shall include, without limitation:

- suggested improvements to the effectiveness of the Security Management Plan;
- . updates to the risk assessments; and
- . suggested improvements in measuring the effectiveness of controls.
- Subject to Paragraph 4.4.4, any change or amendment which the Supplier proposes to make to the Security Management Plan (as a result of a review carried out in accordance with Paragraph 4.4.1, a request by the Buyer or otherwise) shall be subject to the Variation Procedure.
- The Buyer may, acting reasonably, Approve and require changes or amendments to the Security Management Plan to be implemented on timescales faster than set out in the Variation Procedure but, without prejudice to their effectiveness, all such changes and amendments shall thereafter be subject to the Variation Procedure for the purposes of formalising and documenting the relevant change or amendment.

23. Security breach

- . Either Party shall notify the other in accordance with the agreed security incident management process (as detailed in the Security Management Plan) upon becoming aware of any Breach of Security or any potential or attempted Breach of Security.
- . Without prejudice to the security incident management process, upon becoming aware of any of the circumstances referred to in Paragraph 5.1, the Supplier shall:
 - immediately take all reasonable steps (which shall include any action or changes reasonably required by the Buyer) necessary to:
 - . minimise the extent of actual or potential harm caused by any Breach of Security;
 - remedy such Breach of Security to the extent possible and protect the integrity of the Buyer and the provision of the Goods and/or Services to the extent within its control against any such Breach of Security or attempted Breach of Security;
 - prevent an equivalent breach in the future exploiting the same cause failure; and
 - as soon as reasonably practicable provide to the Buyer, where the Buyer so requests, full details (using the reporting mechanism defined by the Security Management Plan) of the Breach of Security or attempted Breach of Security, including a cause analysis where required by the Buyer.
 - In the event that any action is taken in response to a Breach of Security or potential or attempted Breach of Security that demonstrates non-compliance of the Security Management Plan with the Security Policy (where relevant in accordance with paragraph 2.2) or the requirements of this Schedule, then any required change to the

Security Management Plan shall be at no cost to the Buyer.

Call-Off Schedule 10 (Exit Management)

"Net Book Value"	5 the current net book value of the relevant Supplier Asset(s) calculated in accordance with the Framework Tender or Call-Off Tender (if stated) or (if not stated) the depreciation policy of the Supplier (which the Supplier shall ensure is in accordance with Good Industry Practice);
"Non-Exclusive Assets"	6 those Supplier Assets used by the Supplier [or a Key Subcontractor] in connection with the Deliverables but which are also used by the Supplier [or Key Subcontractor] for other purposes;

"Registers"	7 the register and configuration database referred to in Paragraph 2.2 of this Schedule;
"Replacement Goods"	8 any goods which are substantially similar to any of the Goods and which the Buyer receives in substitution for any of the Goods following the End Date, whether those goods are provided by the Buyer internally and/or by any third party;
"Replacement Services"	9 any services which are substantially similar to any of the Services and which the Buyer receives in substitution for any of the Services following the End Date, whether those goods are provided by the Buyer internally and/or by any third party;

2. Supplier must always be prepared for contract exit

- 2.1 The Supplier shall within 30 days from the Start Date provide to the Buyer a copy of its depreciation policy to be used for the purposes of calculating Net Book Value.
- 2.2 During the Contract Period, the Supplier shall promptly:
- 2.2.1 create and maintain a detailed register of all Supplier Assets (including description, condition, location and details of ownership and status as either Exclusive Assets or Non-Exclusive Assets and Net Book Value) and Sub-contracts and other relevant agreements required in connection with the Deliverables; and
- 2.2.2 create and maintain a configuration database detailing the technical infrastructure and operating procedures through which the Supplier provides the Deliverables

("Registers").

- 2.3 The Supplier shall:
- 2.3.1 ensure that all Exclusive Assets listed in the Registers are clearly physically identified as such; and
- 2.3.2 procure that all licences for Third Party Software and all Sub-Contracts shall be assignable and/or capable of novation (at no cost or restriction to the Buyer) at the request of the Buyer to the Buyer (and/or its nominee) and/or any Replacement Supplier upon the Supplier ceasing to provide the Deliverables (or part of them) and if the Supplier is unable to do so then the Supplier shall promptly notify the Buyer and the Buyer may require the Supplier to procure an alternative Subcontractor or provider of Deliverables.
 - 2.4 Each Party shall appoint an Exit Manager within three (3) Months of the Start Date. The Parties' Exit Managers will liaise with one another in relation to all issues relevant to the expiry or termination of this Contract.

3. Assisting re-competition for Deliverables

- 3.1 The Supplier shall, on reasonable notice, provide to the Buyer and/or its potential Replacement Suppliers (subject to the potential Replacement Suppliers entering into reasonable written confidentiality undertakings), such information (including any access) as the Buyer shall reasonably require in order to facilitate the preparation by the Buyer of any invitation to tender and/or to facilitate any potential Replacement Suppliers undertaking due diligence (the "Exit Information").
- 3.2 The Supplier acknowledges that the Buyer may disclose the Supplier's Confidential Information (excluding the Supplier's or its Subcontractors' prices or costs) to an actual or prospective Replacement Supplier to the extent that such disclosure is necessary in connection with such engagement.

- 3.3 The Supplier shall provide complete updates of the Exit Information on an asrequested basis as soon as reasonably practicable and notify the Buyer within five (5) Working Days of any material change to the Exit Information which may adversely impact upon the provision of any Deliverables (and shall consult the Buyer in relation to any such changes).
- 3.4 The Exit Information shall be accurate and complete in all material respects and shall be sufficient to enable a third party to prepare an informed offer for those Deliverables; and not be disadvantaged in any procurement process compared to the Supplier.

4. Exit Plan

- 4.1 The Supplier shall, within three (3) Months after the Start Date, deliver to the Buyer an Exit Plan which complies with the requirements set out in Paragraph 4.3 of this Schedule and is otherwise reasonably satisfactory to the Buyer.
- 4.2 The Parties shall use reasonable endeavours to agree the contents of the Exit Plan. If the Parties are unable to agree the contents of the Exit Plan within twenty (20) Working Days of the latest date for its submission pursuant to Paragraph 4.1, then such Dispute shall be resolved in accordance with the Dispute Resolution Procedure.
- 4.3 The Exit Plan shall set out, as a minimum:
- 4.3.1 a detailed description of both the transfer and cessation processes, including a timetable;
- 4.3.2 how the Deliverables will transfer to the Replacement Supplier and/or the Buyer;
- 4.3.3 details of any contracts which will be available for transfer to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier upon the Expiry Date together with any reasonable costs required to effect such transfer;
- 4.3.4 proposals for the training of key members of the Replacement Supplier's staff in connection with the continuation of the provision of the Deliverables following the Expiry Date;
- 4.3.5 proposals for providing the Buyer or a Replacement Supplier copies of all documentation relating to the use and operation of the Deliverables and required for their continued use;
- 4.3.6 proposals for the assignment or novation of all services utilised by the Supplier in connection with the supply of the Deliverables;
- 4.3.7 proposals for the identification and return of all Buyer Property in the possession of and/or control of the Supplier or any third party;
- 4.3.8 proposals for the disposal of any redundant Deliverables and materials;
- 4.3.9 how the Supplier will ensure that there is no disruption to or degradation of the Deliverables during the Termination Assistance Period; and

- 4.3.10 any other information or assistance reasonably required by the Buyer or a Replacement Supplier.
 - 4.4 The Supplier shall:
- 4.4.1 maintain and update the Exit Plan (and risk management plan) no less frequently than:
 - (a) throughout the Contract Period; and
 - (b) no later than [twenty (20) Working Days after a request from the Buyer for an up-to-date copy of the Exit Plan;
 - (c) as soon as reasonably possible following a Termination Assistance Notice, and in any event no later than ten (10)

 Working Days after the date of the Termination Assistance Notice:
 - (d) as soon as reasonably possible following, and in any event no later than twenty (20) Working Days following, any material change to the Deliverables (including all changes under the Variation Procedure); and
- 4.4.2 jointly review and verify the Exit Plan if required by the Buyer and promptly correct any identified failures.
 - 4.5 Only if (by notification to the Supplier in writing) the Buyer agrees with a draft Exit Plan provided by the Supplier under Paragraph 4.2 or 4.4 (as the context requires), shall that draft become the Exit Plan for this Contract.
 - 4.6 A version of an Exit Plan agreed between the parties shall not be superseded by any draft submitted by the Supplier.

5. Termination Assistance

- 5.1 The Buyer shall be entitled to require the provision of Termination Assistance at any time during the Contract Period by giving written notice to the Supplier (a "Termination Assistance Notice") at least four (4) Months prior to the Expiry Date or as soon as reasonably practicable (but in any event, not later than one (1) Month) following the service by either Party of a Termination Notice. The Termination Assistance Notice shall specify:
- 5.1.1 the nature of the Termination Assistance required; and
- 5.1.2 the start date and initial period during which it is anticipated that Termination Assistance will be required, which shall continue no longer than twelve (12) Months after the End Date.
 - 5.2 The Buyer shall have an option to extend the Termination Assistance Period beyond the initial period specified in the Termination Assistance Notice in one or more extensions, in each case provided that:

- 5.2.1 no such extension shall extend the Termination Assistance Period beyond the date twelve (12) Months after the End Date; and
- 5.2.2 the Buyer shall notify the Supplier of any such extension no later than twenty (20) Working Days prior to the date on which the Termination Assistance Period is otherwise due to expire.
 - 5.3 The Buyer shall have the right to terminate its requirement for Termination Assistance by serving not less than twenty (20) Working Days' written notice upon the Supplier.
 - 5.4 In the event that Termination Assistance is required by the Buyer but at the relevant time the parties are still agreeing an update to the Exit Plan pursuant to Paragraph 4, the Supplier will provide the Termination Assistance in good faith and in accordance with the principles in this Schedule and the last Buyer approved version of the Exit Plan (insofar as it still applies).

6. Termination Assistance Period

- 6.1 Throughout the Termination Assistance Period the Supplier shall:
- 6.1.1 continue to provide the Deliverables (as applicable) and otherwise perform its obligations under this Contract and, if required by the Buyer, provide the Termination Assistance:
- 6.1.2 provide to the Buyer and/or its Replacement Supplier any reasonable assistance and/or access requested by the Buyer and/or its Replacement Supplier including assistance and/or access to facilitate the orderly transfer of responsibility for and conduct of the Deliverables to the Buyer and/or its Replacement Supplier;
- 6.1.3 use all reasonable endeavours to reallocate resources to provide such assistance without additional costs to the Buyer;
- 6.1.4 subject to Paragraph 6.3, provide the Deliverables and the Termination Assistance at no detriment to the Performance Indicators (PI's) or Service Levels, the provision of the Management Information or any other reports nor to any other of the Supplier's obligations under this Contract;
- 6.1.5 at the Buyer's request and on reasonable notice, deliver up-to-date Registers to the Buyer;
- 6.1.6 seek the Buyer's prior written consent to access any Buyer Premises from which the de-installation or removal of Supplier Assets is required.
 - 6.2 If it is not possible for the Supplier to reallocate resources to provide such assistance as is referred to in Paragraph 6.1.2 without additional costs to the Buyer, any additional costs incurred by the Supplier in providing such reasonable assistance shall be subject to the Variation Procedure.
 - 6.3 If the Supplier demonstrates to the Buyer's reasonable satisfaction that the provision of the Termination Assistance will have a material, unavoidable adverse effect on the Supplier's ability to meet one or more particular Service Levels, the Parties shall vary the relevant Service Levels and/or the applicable Service Credits accordingly.

7. Obligations when the contract is terminated

- 7.1 The Supplier shall comply with all of its obligations contained in the Exit Plan.
- 7.2 Upon termination or expiry or at the end of the Termination Assistance Period (or earlier if this does not adversely affect the Supplier's performance of the Deliverables and the Termination Assistance), the Supplier shall:
- 7.2.1 vacate any Buyer Premises;
- 7.2.2 remove the Supplier Equipment together with any other materials used by the Supplier to supply the Deliverables and shall leave the Sites in a clean, safe and tidy condition. The Supplier is solely responsible for making good any damage to the Sites or any objects contained thereon, other than fair wear and tear, which is caused by the Supplier;
- 7.2.3 provide access during normal working hours to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier for up to twelve (12) Months after expiry or termination to:
 - (a) such information relating to the Deliverables as remains in the possession or control of the Supplier; and
 - (b) such members of the Supplier Staff as have been involved in the design, development and provision of the Deliverables and who are still employed by the Supplier, provided that the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier shall pay the reasonable costs of the Supplier actually incurred in responding to such requests for access.
 - 7.3 Except where this Contract provides otherwise, all licences, leases and authorisations granted by the Buyer to the Supplier in relation to the Deliverables shall be terminated with effect from the end of the Termination Assistance Period.

8. Assets, Sub-contracts and Software

- 8.1 Following notice of termination of this Contract and during the Termination Assistance Period, the Supplier shall not, without the Buyer's prior written consent:
- 8.1.1 terminate, enter into or vary any Subcontract or licence for any software in connection with the Deliverables; or
- 8.1.2 (subject to normal maintenance requirements) make material modifications to, or dispose of, any existing Supplier Assets or acquire any new Supplier Assets.
 - 8.2 Within twenty (20) Working Days of receipt of the up-to-date Registers provided by the Supplier, the Buyer shall notify the Supplier setting out:
- 8.2.1 which, if any, of the Transferable Assets the Buyer requires to be transferred to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier ("**Transferring Assets**");
- 8.2.2 which, if any, of:
- (a) the Exclusive Assets that are not Transferable Assets; and

(b) the Non-Exclusive Assets,

the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier requires the continued use of; and

- 8.2.3 which, if any, of Transferable Contracts the Buyer requires to be assigned or novated to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier (the "Transferring Contracts"),
 - in order for the Buyer and/or its Replacement Supplier to provide the Deliverables from the expiry of the Termination Assistance Period. The Supplier shall provide all reasonable assistance required by the Buyer and/or its Replacement Supplier to enable it to determine which Transferable Assets and Transferable Contracts are required to provide the Deliverables or the Replacement Goods and/or Replacement Services.
 - 8.3 With effect from the expiry of the Termination Assistance Period, the Supplier shall sell the Transferring Assets to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier for their Net Book Value less any amount already paid for them through the Charges.
 - 8.4 Risk in the Transferring Assets shall pass to the Buyer or the Replacement Supplier (as appropriate) at the end of the Termination Assistance Period and title shall pass on payment for them.
 - 8.5 Where the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier requires continued use of any Exclusive Assets that are not Transferable Assets or any Non-Exclusive Assets, the Supplier shall as soon as reasonably practicable:
- 8.5.1 procure a non-exclusive, perpetual, royalty-free licence for the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier to use such assets (with a right of sub-licence or assignment on the same terms); or failing which
- 8.5.2 procure a suitable alternative to such assets, the Buyer or the Replacement Supplier to bear the reasonable proven costs of procuring the same.
 - 8.6 The Supplier shall as soon as reasonably practicable assign or procure the novation of the Transferring Contracts to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier. The Supplier shall execute such documents and provide such other assistance as the Buyer reasonably requires to effect this novation or assignment.
 - 8.7 The Buyer shall:
- 8.7.1 accept assignments from the Supplier or join with the Supplier in procuring a novation of each Transferring Contract; and
- 8.7.2 once a Transferring Contract is novated or assigned to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier, discharge all the obligations and liabilities created by or arising under that Transferring Contract and exercise its rights arising under that Transferring Contract, or as applicable, procure that the Replacement Supplier does the same.
 - 8.8 The Supplier shall hold any Transferring Contracts on trust for the Buyer until the transfer of the relevant Transferring Contract to the Buyer and/or the Replacement Supplier has taken place.

8.9 The Supplier shall indemnify the Buyer (and/or the Replacement Supplier, as applicable) against each loss, liability and cost arising out of any claims made by a counterparty to a Transferring Contract which is assigned or novated to the Buyer (and/or Replacement Supplier) pursuant to Paragraph 8.6 in relation to any matters arising prior to the date of assignment or novation of such Transferring Contract. Clause 19 (Other people's rights in this contract) shall not apply to this Paragraph 8.9 which is intended to be enforceable by Third Parties Beneficiaries by virtue of the CRTPA.

9. No charges

9.1 Unless otherwise stated, the Buyer shall not be obliged to pay for costs incurred by the Supplier in relation to its compliance with this Schedule.

10. Dividing the bills

- 10.1 All outgoings, expenses, rents, royalties and other periodical payments receivable in respect of the Transferring Assets and Transferring Contracts shall be apportioned between the Buyer and/or the Replacement and the Supplier as follows:
- 10.1.1 the amounts shall be annualised and divided by 365 to reach a daily rate;
- 10.1.2 the Buyer or Replacement Supplier (as applicable) shall be responsible for or entitled to (as the case may be) that part of the value of the invoice pro rata to the number of complete days following the transfer, multiplied by the daily rate; and
- 10.1.3 the Supplier shall be responsible for or entitled to (as the case may be) the rest of the invoice.

PURPOSE

- The intention to establish a Health Data Research Service (HDRS) was announced by the Prime Minister in April of this year. The Government and Wellcome Trust have announced up to £600m investment, with up to £500m government funding over five years, to establish HDRS. This service will be a 'secure single point of access to local and national-scale datasets for researchers, beginning in 2026. It is intended to be a sustainable and long-term initiative.
- HDRS is intended to create a true-step change for secure access to UK-wide health data, developing a globally competitive service that builds on the foundations of the 'NHS Research SDE Network' and other health data infrastructure initiatives to date across the UK. As part of the service's design and development, the Government has committed to co-design with stakeholders to ensure HDRS is fit for purpose and meets customer needs.
- The main aim of this market research project is to inform the incoming CEO and executive team on the scale and scope of the service offer customers are seeking across a wide range of possible functions that HDRS could develop to ensure the best possible investment of the available funding.
- In order to articulate the form and function of this service and develop a plan for delivering a minimal viable service by December 2026, DHSC is procuring two pieces of advice to contribute to wider discovery activities currently underway. These include this specification [Lot 1: Commercial Framework Landscape] and the specification for Lot 2: Customer Needs Assessment.

BACKGROUND TO THE CONTRACTING AUTHORITY

DHSC supports ministers in leading the nation's health and social care to help people live more independent, healthier lives for longer.

BACKGROUND TO REQUIREMENT/OVERVIEW OF REQUIREMENT

BACKGROUND TO WORK PACKAGE A

- Despite significant external interest and previous published analyses, there is still limited clarity on what a realistic estimate is for the total potential financial value to providing controlled and secure access to health and care data for secondary uses, specifically research purposes. Previous analysis, for instance a study by EY, showed significant £bn/yr potential in value. These studies are neither specific enough in terms of direct financial returns as a proportion of wider value, nor grounded sufficiently in current and future policy or infrastructure.
- The goal of the first work-package is to understand a realistic value range for the total Service Obtainable Market value available from charging for data access and associated services through HDRS. This needs to be built upon and cognisant of:
 - Data access policy and the shift towards Secure Data Environment use, moving away from a system of data sharing.
 - The varied approaches in operation across the UK.
 - Current maturity of infrastructure, including availability and quality of data.
 - International market analysis of similar services and comparator of commercial models internationally.
 - What customers are willing to pay for the service, in light of its quality and international competition.
 - The wider literature on public sector data value, in particular health, as well as international evidence.
 - Learnings and recommendations from previous public engagement on realising the value of health and care data and bounds of public expectation and trust.
 - The trade-offs between maximising financial returns and realising other forms of value (for instance seeking value through preferable access to medicines, revenue-sharing of income made through research or shares in intellectual property).

The outputs of this work package will primarily be analysis to assess and quantify the potential financial value of the access to data to be made available under HDRS for research purposes, set in the context of the wider value benefits gained from providing access to data for research, such

as new treatments improving direct patient care. The work-package A outputs are expected to be in the form of value ranges to inform work-package B, help benchmark future strategic decisions and should consider whether the value returns are dependent on the size and type of future investments.

BACKGROUND TO WORK-PACKAGE B

The second work-package would look to explore the potential value-capture and value-share models available, while considering the institutional structures that could be modified or established to best realise the financial returns of data access for research purposes.

The options developed from this work-package should consider how value can be captured throughout the service journey and appropriate mechanisms for sharing of value with health and care data partners. It may include considerations of models which are not possible under current policy and/or legislation to inform future reform. All proposed models must be viewed through the lens of patient, public and healthcare professionals' acceptability, alongside other factors (such as level of financial return and required policy development). They should also be mindful of interoperability with the commercial principles and practises being developed presently across the UK.

SCOPE OF REQUIREMENT

Despite the external reports and progress to date, more could be done to understand the actual realisable financial returns for charging for access to health data and associated services, as well as an appraisal of the different methodologies to calculate that value. This analysis should consider the value of different types of data as well as service quality metrics (e.g. speed of access, data quality and data type). This analysis should be grounded in the implementation of current and near term research infrastructure across the UK, and customer insight to understand demand factors (e.g. international competition).

More granular information on the scale of demand (and the market segmentation associated with this) would help to inform what vehicles and structures could be used to best realise that value, and their associated trade-offs, risks and benefits. For instance, the impact of maximising financial returns on realising other forms of value, such as revenue-sharing, as well as considering not exploring new models and maintaining current processes in operation across the UK. Any recommendations on proposed models must be viewed through the lens of patient & public acceptability, alongside other factors (such as level of financial return).

The Potential Provider will produce quantitative and qualitative analyses of the data value opportunities for HDRS and how they could be harnessed. It is expected that this should include desk research and economic analysis, as well as engagement with key stakeholders across the UK and from relevant international institutions, the research community (including data science), patient and public representatives, as well as industry. The *contracting authority* will assist in providing contacts, as well as unpublished analysis where essential.

The Potential Provider would need to demonstrate understanding of:

- the broad range of existing published literature relating to health and care data value and value realisation, both nationally and internationally, including key factors that would impact implementation;
- Economic analysis (including understanding of Green Book requirements) how to value
 data for different uses and users (in terms of financial or non-financial benefits to the NHS,
 to patients, as well as wider economic and social benefits), and how to unlock this value,
 including through equitable and sustainable partnerships between the NHS and research,
 charity and commercial partners;
- The uses of routine clinical and operational data for research and innovation, the health and care data landscape within the UK including key stakeholders, as well as the wider life sciences industry;
- The way in which data flows through the health system and is accessed in the UK, principally in the NHS Research SDE Network, NHS DigiTrials, CPRD, OpenSafely, Genomics England, Our Future Health, NIHR Bioresource, UK Biobank, SAIL, Research Data Scotland and Northern Ireland Honest Broker System;
- International context and comparators an understanding of structures, trends and investments in healthcare data-driven innovation in other countries, and the lessons and good practice (and time imperatives) we should consider in the UK to maximise the benefits we secure from health and care data; and
- Different healthcare data commercial partnership structures and business/investment models (in the UK and globally). While wholesale adoption of other models would take time to implement, which features if adopted or emulated would help maximise returns on/benefits from investment in data quality and access, with greatest potential to be lasting and self-sustaining over time?
- The need for Public Trust and for outputs and recommendations to be appraised against this requirement.

THE REQUIREMENT

There are two work packages required to support the project outlined in the background of this document:

- Work Package A: Explore the full realisable value of UK health and care data.
- Work Package B: Provide recommendations on the potential options for realising that value as well as the risks and trade-offs with different approaches.

With an overall aim to define the full realisable financial value of health data when accessed for research purposes and evaluate potential value capture models to realise this value from HDRS.

Work package A: Will focus on identifying the Service Obtainable Market value of health and care data in the UK when accessed for secondary purposes via the Health Data Research Service, segmented by use case. Primarily this is in terms of financial income, but whilst considering the balance and context of other types of value, such as benefits to patients, to society, and to the wider UK economy:

- What is a realistic obtainable value/market share over a 10-year time horizon for HDRS, and what is an approximate trajectory between the current as-is and that obtainable value?
- Estimates could be presented based on anticipated inputs to achieve that level of value, for instance the level of investment into the programme. This should factor in the actual demand (volume, value, nature) for health and care data via this format and means, building in deep analysis of customer insight and behaviour, as well as knowledge of the services available now and possible over the given time horizon.
- The key output will be to define the Service Obtainable Market (SOM) for the HDRS, though it is recognised this will need to be considered within the context of the Service Addressable Market (SAM) and Total Available Market (TAM).
- What are the major step changes we should expect in value realisation along that 10-year
 journey, both on supply and demand side of the service? E.g. what would be the impact
 of increasing volumes of data use or new technological advances be, especially those
 which may increase users or improve competitiveness internationally? And how could
 demand shift with the planned changes to be delivered through the HDRS programme?

- The focus of this work is an assessment of the obtainable financial value from providing
 access to data for research purposes via the HDRS. However, this valuation should show
 consideration of total value and presented alongside approximate proportions of other
 value benefits from research e.g. health benefits, cash-returning benefits, investment in
 UK, R&D uptick, other).
- An overview of price points and charging mechanisms for comparable services providing data for research purposes both domestically and internationally.
- Market segmentation (of users) and sub-segmentation associated with this.
- What is our USP, where are others more competitive? How could our relative high- or low-competitiveness translate into the potential value we can realise?
- What are the current learnings from NHS Research Secure Data Environment Network, NHS DigiTrials, CPRD, Open Safely, Genomics England, Our Future Health, NIHR Bioresource, UK Biobank, SAIL, Research Data Scotland and NI Honest Broker System?
- International competitiveness how does the inherent 'value' of UK health data for research compare to other international competitors (e.g. US, France, Germany, Israel, Holland).

Some publications quote £billion valuations/year, but our appraisal is these are often based on assumptions of future infrastructure or policy decisions which will never be realised. This analysis should instead be grounded in the reality of delivery and implementation via HDRS, in combination with customer insight to reach an ambitious yet realistic conclusion.

Work package B: Will design, develop and evaluate the most appropriate options for best realising the service obtainable market value outlined in A.

- This work-package will contribute towards recommendations on changes to the delivery model/vehicle for making data available for research. This work will build upon planned policy scoping work to be conducted ahead of this phase to frame a realistic set of options to build upon but is likely to first require deep analysis across several areas to ensure comprehensive analysis. This will include:
 - An analytical review of different value return models for data access, assessing viability of realising a revenue-generating model. Focus primarily on UK implementation, utilising comparisons to international examples where appropriate.
 - Modelling of the impact of different charging policies on value return. For instance, this could include analysis of factors affecting price, relative to the service users are offered: types of data (genomics, text, images), service quality, data quality.
- The primary output of this work-package will be a deep analysis and appraisal of a short list of potential options that could be used to realise greater value return of data access. This is likely to involve factors including legal and IP, potential value return. In particular the legal constraints and implications of proposals must be considered and articulated.
- What are the options to generate financial value charging access, share of sales, revenue, equity etc. What are the perspectives of these options from the diverse range of data users upsides, downsides, red lines. High, medium, low estimates on money generated from each?
- How could any financial returns be utilised, and what are the practicalities/challenges of doing so? E.g. into frontline care, into regional tech/data investments, into a centralised fund – and how does this relate to public trust.
- What needs to be invested in and built to enable value potential to be achieved and over what timeframes is this viable.

KEY MILESTONES

The Potential Provider should note that outputs are due to be completed as per the below schedule, across a 8-week project concluding in *October 2025*. Firm dates will be agreed upon contract signing.

While we strongly prioritise the quality and clarity of the recommendations, given the scope and depth of this task, we would expect the recommendations section for both work packages to be 20-30 pages long (exclusive of raw analysis). This ensures that the analysis is sufficiently detailed to support well-founded and actionable policy guidance.

AUTHORITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The authority will assist in providing appropriate contacts, as well as unpublished analysis where essential, but the provider should also bring their own contacts and suggestions for how to hear from new voices to define this work. There are a range of well heard voices in this space, and these should not be heard at the expense of other, less regularly questioned expertise.

The Authority will provide a clear senior and working level point of contact throughout the 8-week contract period and ensure a representative is available at all scheduled meetings to discuss the project.

CONTRACT AND SERVICE MANAGEMENT

Twice weekly progress review meetings between the Authority and the Contractor for the duration of the 8-week project. These can be conducted virtually within regular office hours.

The Potential Provider is required to operate in a transparent way, and to share all developing analysis and outputs in an open manner.

REPORTING

Robust project management and regular accurate reporting is essential throughout the entire contract period. This will enable the Department to monitor the contract delivery, manage risks, and fulfil internal governance-reporting requirements. The successful supplier will be expected to regularly meet with DHSC and report in line with the finalised set of milestones and KPIs. The supplier will also be expected to report potential problems to DHSC promptly and develop corrective actions and mitigations to keep delivery on track.

CONTRACT DURATION

The length of this contract will be 8 weeks.

STAFF AND CUSTOMER SERVICE

The Authority requires the potential provider to provide a sufficient level of resource throughout the duration of the Discovery Lot 1 Contract to consistently deliver a quality service to all Parties.

Potential provider's staff assigned to the Discovery Lot 1 Contract shall have the relevant qualifications and experience to deliver the Contract.

Potential Provider will have demonstrable skills and experience of the following:

Advisory and consultancy expertise

Life Sciences and/or Data commercial expertise within the UK and/or globally

Business development expertise

Commercial legal awareness

Market researchers

Qual and quant analysts

Engagement expertise

Presentation and reporting writing expertise

Project management expertise

The Potential Provider shall ensure that staff understand the Authority's vision and objectives and will provide excellent customer service to the Authority throughout the duration of the Contract.

The potential Provider will be expected to work closely with the potential provider of the Discovery Lot 2 Customer Needs Assessment to share relevant insights to the development of the complementary discovery activities, and where relevant the engagement of common stakeholders.

SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

The Potential Provider must employ the appropriate organisational, operational and technological processes and procedures to keep personal data safe from unauthorised use or access, loss, destruction, theft or disclosure. The Potential Provider will securely process and store personal data in accordance with the Data Protection Act.

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS (IPR)

Intellectual property will remain property of the Contracting Authority.

PAYMENT

Payment can only be made following satisfactory delivery of pre-agreed certified products and deliverables.

Before payment can be considered, each invoice must include a detailed elemental breakdown of work completed and the associated costs.

LOCATION

The location of the Services will be carried out at the provider's premises. Occasional additional commute to London might be required.
