Section 4 – Specification

1. Introduction

The UK Government's National AI Strategy¹ sought to ensure that the UK strengths in AI are effectively captured to drive economic growth and productivity. Part of the strategy is seeking to support low AI maturity industry sectors in adopting AI solutions. Supported by DCMS funded research².³ in understanding the new dynamics in AI adoption, the work in this tender is seeking to identify a supplier to provide services to deliver 4 industry sector focused workshops with the aim of facilitating sector challenge identification that will analyse and extract business challenges and opportunities that can be addressed by AI & ML innovations, to drive productivity gains in these sectors. Suppliers are required to further refine the outputs from these workshops and produce a report that will be made publicly available and is intended to be used as an evidence backed resource to inspire development of AI & ML solutions.

The work in this tender is part of a wider investment by Innovate UK (BridgeAI) to address barriers to AI adoption and diffusion.

Despite advances in AI research and successes in the UK AI private sector, there is a risk of not realizing economic and social benefits in the UK economy in sectors that currently demonstrate low AI maturity. There is already evidence that sectors such as Supply chain management, Energy, Agriculture and Transportation are not only lagging in AI adoption but also do not attract attention of AI developers to develop solutions for these sectors⁴. The primary market failure in this context is information asymmetries and externalities, that are limiting these industries to make productivity gains by adopting AI. In support of this, the interim evaluation report by Ipsos MORI⁵ has highlighted the importance of collaborative R&D in development of new AI solutions, by means of enabling access to relevant datasets from end-users.

The overall aim of the tender is to support development of use cases to drive new AI & ML solutions to support the transition to an AI-enabled economy, capturing the benefits of AI innovation in the UK, and ensuring AI technologies benefits all sectors with growth and productivity gains.

Innovate UK is seeking tenders from suppliers to deliver 4 workshops, one for each target sector (construction, agri-food, creative industries, transport) that will support industry representatives from senior management, identify areas within business operations that can benefit from AI & ML solutions. Following from these workshops, suppliers are required to validate the findings with further research. The output of this work will result in a publication that will provide opportunities for novel applications of AI & ML, presented as evidence backed use cases. The overall desired benefit is to stimulate AI & ML adoption that AI developers could focus to develop new products and solutions.

2. Aims & Objectives

The aim of this tender exercise is to identify and appoint a supplier to deliver 4 industry sector focused workshops to identify a long list of opportunities where novel applications AI & ML can drive improvements in business productivity and further validate this evidence with follow on research.

Specific objectives:

- Design and delivery of industry sector specific workshops for challenge identification.
- Provide a structured approach to ensure that all areas of business operations can be evaluated.
- Provide an approach to ensure that opportunities discovered do not gravitate towards already emerged solutions or products.
- Support 20-40 senior managers during workshops and advise if there is a requirement for pre-work for those attending the workshops.
- Integrate contribution and input from workshops in methodology for follow on research to quantify the market value for a short list of identified opportunities.
- Propose and agree with Innovate UK a ratio of SME and Large organisations to participate in each workshops to ensure the outputs from this work maximize economic benefits to the sector.

Produce a co-branded (Innovate UK, Supplier) report to be published, that maximizes impact of outputs of this work in raising awareness of opportunities for development of new AI & ML solutions for sector specific challenges that can drive productivity growth.

3. Background to the Requirement

Innovate UK is delivering an adoption and diffusion programme (BridgeAI) that seeks to increase business productivity in key industry sectors through stimulation of adoption of AI & ML technologies. The programme includes a diverse set of interventions to increase sector capabilities through upskilling, establishing networks between AI adopter businesses and AI developers and making provision of grant funding to support identified innovation opportunities in AI & ML that can drive productivity gains.

The output of the work in this tender is intended to educate, inspire and raise awareness of specific challenges faced by businesses in target sectors that can be addressed with new innovative AI & ML technologies. This work is intended to benefit in the short term at least two additional workstreams delivered by Innovate UK.

- 1. Residential Innovation labs to be delivered in September that will focus on technical development of novel AI & ML solutions for target sectors.
 - i. Will benefit from evidence validated use cases.
- 2. £35 million Innovate UK funding competition.
 - i. Will benefit from evidence validated use cases.

Innovate UK in collaboration with Innovate UK KTN will advertise a call for senior managers from target sectors and will manage registrations and venue booking. Innovate UK will deliver a number of activities ahead of delivery of the workshops tendered in this document to drive awareness of the opportunity.

Suppliers are responsible for the process design and delivery of the workshop activities.

Participants: are the core subject of the workshops that will bring their business operation insight.

4. Scope

The supplier is expected to:

- Provide expertise in the design and delivery of the workshops.
- Provide expertise and suggest onboarding activities/pre-work if required by workshop participants.
- Provide a justification for why the methodology chosen will meet the set objectives.
- Provide on-site facilitation for 4 face to face workshops in London.
- Provide access to software licences as and if required for delivery.
- Set timeline and meetings required during pre-event delivery to engage with Innovate UK and ensure all objectives required for successful delivery are captured appropriately and used to influence workshops.
- Have a risk register and mitigation plan to ensure optimal delivery.
- Provide a methodology in capturing the insights from workshop delivery.
- Provide a methodology in filtering the long list of options discovered during workshops to short list, using the potential economic benefit of such options as they key determinant.
- Provide a methodology in further validating the short list options with follow on research.
 This could include interview and market research.

The supplier is expected to demonstrate skills related to:

- Management and technical consultancy.
- Knowledge of key sectors the workshops are addressing.
- Knowledge of AI & ML technologies.
- Facilitating challenge identification, including methodology in capturing outputs.
- Delivering research to validate findings from workshops.
- Writing of reports to communicate outputs relating to business

- Venue selection and procurement.
- Stakeholder selection.

Section 5 - Evaluation of Bids

The evaluation model below shall be used for this ITQ, which will be determined to two decimal places.

Where a question is 'for information only' it will not be scored.

The evaluation team may comprise staff from UK SBS and the Contracting Authority and any specific external stakeholders the Contracting Authority deems required.

To maintain a high degree of rigour in the evaluation of your bid, a process of commercial moderation will be undertaken to ensure consistency by all evaluators.

After evaluation and if required moderation scores will be finalised by performing a calculation to identify (at question level) the mean average of all evaluators (Example – a question is scored by three evaluators and judged as scoring 5, 5 and 6. These scores will be added together and divided by the number of evaluators to produce the final score of $5.33 (5+5+6=16\div 3=5.33)$

Evaluation of criteria

Non-Commercial Elements

Each question will be judged on a score from 0 to 100, which shall be subjected to a multiplier to reflect the percentage of the evaluation criteria allocated to that question.

Where an evaluation criterion is worth 20% then the 0-100 score achieved will be multiplied by 20%.

Example if a Bidder scores 60 from the available 100 points this will equate to 12% by using the following calculation:

Score = {weighting percentage} x {bidder's score} = 20% x 60 = 12

The same logic will be applied to groups of questions which equate to a single evaluation criterion.

All questions will be scored based on the above mechanism. Please be aware that there may be multiple evaluators. If so, their individual scores will be averaged (mean) to determine your final score as follows:

Example

Evaluator 1 scored your bid as 60

Evaluator 2 scored your bid as 60

Evaluator 3 scored your bid as 40

Evaluator 4 scored your bid as 40

Your final score will $(60+60+40+40) \div 4 = 50$

Once the above evaluation process has been undertaken and the scores are apportioned by evaluator(s) this will then be subject to an independent commercial review and moderation meeting, if required by the commercial lead, any and all changes will be formally recorded relative to the regulatory obligations associated with this procurement, so as to ensure that the procurement has been undertaken in a robust and transparent way.

Commercial Elements will be evaluated on the following criteria.

The lowest price for a response which meets the pass criteria shall score 100. All other bids shall be scored on a pro rata basis in relation to the lowest price. The score is then subject to a multiplier to reflect the percentage value of the Commercial criterion.

For example - Bid 1 £100,000 scores 100.

Bid 2 £120,000 differential of £20,000 or 20% remove 20% from price scores 80

Bid 3 £150,000 differential £50,000 remove 50% from price scores 50.

Bid 4 £175,000 differential £75,000 remove 75% from price scores 25.

Bid 5 £200,000 differential £100,000 remove 100% from price scores 0.

Bid 6 £300,000 differential £200,000 remove 100% from price scores 0.

Where the scoring criterion is worth 50% then the 0-100 score achieved will be multiplied by 50.

In the example if a supplier scores 80 from the available 100 points this will equate to 40% by using the following calculation: Score/Total Points multiplied by 50 (80/100 x 50 = 40)

The lowest score possible is 0 even if the price submitted is more than 100% greater than the lowest price.

This evaluation criteria will therefore not be subject to any averaging, as this is a mathematical scoring criterion, but will still be subject to a commercial review.

- 7.18 Do not collude to fix or adjust the price or withdraw your Bid with another Party as we will reject your Bid.
- 7.19 Do not offer UK SBS or the Contracting Authority staff any inducement or we will reject your Bid.
- 7.20 Do not seek changes to the Bid after responses have been submitted and the deadline for Bids to be submitted has passed.
- 7.21 Do not cross reference answers to external websites or other parts of your Bid, the cross references and website links will not be considered.
- 7.22 Do not exceed word counts, the additional words will not be considered.
- 7.23 Do not make your Bid conditional on acceptance of your own Terms of Contract, as your Bid will be rejected.
- 7.24 Do not unless explicitly requested by the Contracting Authority either in the procurement documents or via a formal clarification from the Contracting Authority send your response by any way other than via the Jaggaer eSourcing portal. Responses received by any other method than requested will not be considered for the opportunity.

- 7.27 Question numbering is not sequential and all questions which require submission are included in the Section 6 Evaluation Response Questionnaire.
- 7.28 Any Contract offered may not guarantee any volume of work or any exclusivity of supply.
- 7.29 We do not guarantee to award any Contract as a result of this procurement
- 7.30 All documents issued or received in relation to this procurement shall be the property of the Contracting Authority / UK SBS.
- 7.31 We can amend any part of the procurement documents at any time prior to the latest date / time Bids shall be submitted through the Jaggaer eSourcing Portal.
- 7.32 If you are a Consortium you must provide details of the Consortiums structure.

8.0 Freedom of information

Bidders should note, however, that, even where information is identified as commercially sensitive, the Contracting Authority may be required to disclose such information in accordance with the FolA or the Environmental Information Regulations. In particular, the Contracting Authority is required to form an independent judgment concerning whether the information is exempt from disclosure under the FolA or the EIR and whether the public interest favours disclosure or not. Accordingly, the Contracting Authority cannot guarantee that any information marked 'confidential' or "commercially sensitive" will not be disclosed.
