Context

Description: Description of activity and what is expected to be achieved

Good Growth Hub: Targeted and focussed green and socially responsible business support to deliver Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly's Good Growth ambitions. We want to target businesses that have the ambition and capacity to grow/scale and improve productivity or deliver improvements in their environmental

sustainability or social responsibility through a 'single point of contact' that will offer triage, diagnostic and commissioning of provision and specialist support.

From April 2023, the Good Growth Hub will commission and co-ordinate the provision of business support in CloS from across the public, private and third sectors including skills and training providers to meet local business needs and support entrepreneurs. It will link skills information advice and guidance, employer dialogue and inclusion in design of curriculum and pathways, careers and include a pathfinder single grant funding service. Year 1 delivery (2022-23) will focus on this pathfinder single grant funding service which will go live in Autumn 2022 to deploy smaller scale capital and revenue grants to businesses across Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly.



Figure 1 outlines full Good Growth Hub offer with Year 1 Good Growth Hub delivery indicated by red boxes.

Year 1 Direct Grant Delivery will see a single Grant Funding Service delivered by Cornwall Council's Economy & Skills Service, channelling various business focussed intervention allocations, both capital and revenue, within a single application process. This will include business and skills grant delivery for Net Zero, Business/Employment Growth, Productivity Improvements, Digital, Export, Feasibility, Advanced Manufacturing, RD&I, and Social Enterprise. Specific intervention rates will be attributed to ensure appropriate leverage across grant areas, with grant values ranging from £5000 to £250,000 depending on intervention.

Year 1 delivery of the Grant Funding Service will maximise SPF expenditure whilst allowing for the final delivery stage of ESIF funded business support, requiring a staged approach to the delivery of the wider Good Growth Hub model. Grant deployment will be subject to a number of checkpoints including Good Growth principles, ESIF availability (primary route) and applicant engagement in existing support provision.

Year one grant service development, administration and facilitation costs will be provided through Intervention E23 with expenditure impacting on number of grants delivered. Average grant sizes will be based on comparatives estimates from previous programming, Leverage requirements will be based on SPF programme Joint Committee imperatives and Good Growth thresholds, with default intervention at 50%:

The UK SPF has been launched by UK Government's as part of its wider commitment to level up all parts of the UK and on the key metrics identified in the Levelling Up White Paper Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly is one of the areas in the UK that is most in need of levelling-up. In its Levelling Up White Paper Government outlined that at national level the UK SPF will have a particular focus on the following objectives:

- Boost productivity, pay, jobs and living standards by growing the private sector, especially in those places where they are lagging.
- Spread opportunities and improve public services, especially in those places where they are weakest.
- Restore a sense of community, local pride and belonging, especially in those places where they have been lost.
- Empower local leaders and communities, especially in those places lacking local agency
- To increase levels of functional numeracy in the adult population

This initiation form describes activity which is part of the Supporting Local Business Investment priority which has the following objectives:

- Creating jobs and boosting community cohesion building on existing industries and institutions, from support for starting businesses to visible improvements to local retail, hospitality and leisure sector facilities.
- Bringing together businesses and partners within and across sectors to share knowledge, expertise and resources, and stimulate innovation and growth.

Our Good Growth Investment Plan identifies the need to invest in local businesses through a streamlined and coordinated business support offer in order to drive productivity improvements throughout the CloS economy.

The existing Growth and Skills Hub and a variety of ESIF grant funding to business is delivered by Cornwall Council. In order to ensure coordination and eliminate any duplication the single Grant Funding Service will be deployed as part of the UK SPF Good Growth Hub offer, in parallel with the provision of IDB and wider ESIF business support provision, alongside the subsequent facilitation of transition from existing provision (ESIF) and the co-ordination of procured delivery bodies.

Continued alignment will also be required, through national Growth Hub Funding (BEIS), with a wide range of related activities including Innovate UK (IUK), UK Edge (formerly Enterprise Europe Network), Knowledge Transfer Network (KTN), Department for International Trade (DIT), British Business Bank (BBB), Intellectual Property Office (IPO), Be the Business (Productivity Leadership Group), Banks, ICAEW / Accountants, PBS sector, Angel Networks, Universities/Business Schools, Business Intermediaries (e.g. Chambers, FSB etc), Catapults/Incubators and Accelerators, Better Business for All (BBfA)/Regulators, Government Departments e.g. DCMS, DWP, HMRC and Cabinet Office (SME procurement) and National Cyber Security Centre.

The year 1 Grant Funding Service will also be required to facilitate grant deployment from other SPF activity delivered in parallel, including:

- Research, Development and Innovation skills and business support programme as described in initiation form BUS002
- Trade and Investment Programme as described in initiation form BUS005

All funding expended should contribute to the "Good Growth" requirements outlined in the CloS SPF Good Growth Investment plan. Higher levels of funding distribution may be spent on projects, activity or initiatives that deliver the greatest contribution to these objectives especially where they are located and/or target the areas and people of Cornwall and the IoS most in need of levelling up.

Route to Market: In-house Delivery Explanation of the chosen route to market

The existing Growth and Skills Hub and a variety of ESIF grant funding to business is delivered by Cornwall Council. Therefore, in order to ensure coordination and to eliminate duplication direct delivery by Cornwall Council has been chosen as the most appropriate route to market as Cornwall Council is uniquely placed to put in place a streamlined and fully coordinated business support offer. The Grant Fund Service will be deployed as part of the UK SPF Good Growth Hub offer, in parallel with the provision of IDB and wider ESIF business support provision, alongside the subsequent facilitation of transition from existing provision (ESIF) and the co-ordination of procured delivery bodies.

This model of a single Grant Funding Service with a single access point, avoids multiple external costs for administration, a single Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system for beneficiary tracking with direct approach to performance monitoring, audit and deployment changes.

Specific Requirements: Please identify any specific requirements

Cornwall Council and the Council of the Isles of Scilly are committed to ensure that projects supported through the Shared Prosperity Fund deliver clean (with a particular emphasis on Net Zero and Nature Recovery) and inclusive economic growth. That the jobs created are well paid; quality jobs, that all our communities are able to access the opportunities available through this fund and that our environment benefits from this economic prosperity.

The good growth outcomes have been designed to ensure that all SPF applicants consider the impact of their project and identify what contribution it will make towards good growth. Whilst we accept that not all projects can contribute to every good growth outcome, we will expect projects to:

- encourage projects that contribute the good growth outcomes
- use the good growth outcomes within their assessment criteria
- report on the good growth contribution of the projects they have funded

We therefore expect the delivery plan for the single Grant Funding Service to articulate how the above Good Growth principles will be carried into the delivery of this Year 1 activity under the CloS Good Growth Hub. The good growth policy will provide further detail and support will be provided to Project Managers from within the PMO.

We furthermore expect the delivery plan to outline the in house resource required to initiate Grant Funding Service to deploy grants by October 2022. It is anticipated that CC's procurement team support will be required to support external commissioning which must be in place by April 2023 and the delivery plan must set out steps to engage with this team as well as the in house resource required for Growth & Skills Hub redesign.

The delivery plan proposal in response to this initiation form should:

 Set out how people and skills opportunities can be included as part of wider project delivery and how the proposals will link to existing people and skills activities for example, Multiply, apprenticeships, traineeships, work placements and work experience opportunities. It is important that the proposal articulates how this requirement around skills opportunities is passported to grant recipients through the single grant funding service.

- 2. Demonstrate how activity will complement and not duplicate mainstream and other funded activity. Highlighting the wrap-around support being proposed, and how communities and beneficiaries to be supported will be identified and engaged.
- 3. Respond to a clearly identified need and clearly describe the need.
- 4. Not conflict with national policy or local strategies.
